The two men are F. Gano Chance, President of A. B. Chance Company, nationally-known manufacturing company; and Joe C. Turner, President of Local 821, IUE-CIO, the membership of which works at A. B. Chance Company. Both of these men are my friends. Both have participated in the Freedom Forums held in Searcy, Arkansas, the National Education Program. Both are members of the Centralia Freedom Club whose basic objective is to strengthen and safeguard the structure of American freedom, and whose program is designed to stimulate all Centralia people to fulfill the responsibilities of American citizenship.

PROJECT SPREADING

My friends, Gano Chance and Joe Turner send word that the "Shirt Off My Back" project is spreading throughout the nation as a means of dramatizing the feeling at the grass roots of America that Federal spending and Federal taxes and the size of the Federal Government should be substantially reduced. What makes this project worthy of the attention of citizens everywhere is the pledge, accompanying each shirt mailed to Congress: "Along with this request we agree to quit asking for Federal aid in exchange for your influence in reducing government expenses."

If enough citizens at the grass roots of America will make this pledge and keep it, and join with the people of Centralia in making the "Shirt Off My Back" project nationwide, then Congress, and the Budget Director, and the President and his Cabinet will have to get together and substantially cut the budget.

Next Week: Where the budget can be cut—\$6.5 billion.

A ROYAL TOUR awaits some Michigan Miss picked by County dairy committees as a candidate for the statewide Michigan Dairy Princess selection.

On May 7 and 8, county Dairy Princess winners from some 40 counties will gather at Michigan State University for selection of the state princess who will represent Michigan and dairy farmers and processors for the coming year.

"Interest in the event is very enthusiastic," says Charles Stone, State director for the American Dairy Association, the program's major sponsor. Competition among entrants for the County Dairy Princess contests is keen. In Huron County for example, there are 41 girls entered.

The princess is selected in conjunction with the "June is Dairy Month" program sponsored by five statewide milk producer and processing groups.

The lucky lass picked in the May finals will find a busy year ahead of her. She will immediately tour the eastern United States as an ambassador for Michigan Week. The trip will take her to Washington, D. C. and New York City. Later, her summer will be filled with trips to county celebrations and fairs. Her biggest event comes in October when Michigan's Dairy Princess will travel to Chicago to compete with entrants from all over the U.S. for the title of National Dairy Queen.

Last year's festivities drew 37 candidates, with the present reigning Princess, Louise Lagoy, chosen from Calhoun County. Muriel Goodrich of Walkerville was the runner-up.

All entrants at the Lansing finals will receive gifts, corsages and trips around the state's capitol.
