 In case anyone is laboring under the misconception that the Woodcreek Farms Women's Association is a purely social organization—the kind where members meet once a month to eat and gossip, the following list of accomplishments for the past year under the leadership of President Zella Missal should dispel such a notion.  
 Woodcreek mothers collected \$257.35 towards the March of Dimes Polio fund. They also collected \$222.00 for the Farmington Area United Fund and Community Chest and \$16 and forty garments for the Needlework Guild Incubator.  
 All dues collected during this period were used to contribute towards Hungarian Relief, the Heart Fund and Cancer Fund, and for small remembrances to association members on the sick list.  
 Approximately 40 active members donated the necessary white materials, and pinned and sewed 1700 cancer pads. More than 100 white shirts were donated to the Pontiac Convalescent Hospital.

 In addition to these services, which are the primary reason for the association's existence as a group, members also related at summer picnics, dinner dances, and at an annual Christmas luncheon.
