Plans Announced,

Plans are now being completed for the fourth annual "Scout-O-Rama" to be put on by members of the Clinton Valley Boy Scout Council, Ottawa District, at the Walled Lake Senior High School on Saturday, April 27.

Earl Gruber of Westegers, general chairman of the public exhibition and stage show, said that 50 Scout units representing 2,500 boys and 800 adult leaders including units from Farmington, will participate in the event.

Forty-one booths are planned for the "Scout-O-Rama," which will depict 10 years of a boy's life including hobbies, conservation, emergency service and survival, scoutcraft and scout skills, vocations and Indian lore.

Keynoting the planning is action, reports Gruber. "Demonstrations of each subject are planned to show parents and the public just what Scouting does."

The "Scout-O-Rama" will be open from 2 to 9:30 p.m. Stage shows will be presented at 3:30 and 8:15 p.m.

Amos, who is serving as chairman on the various committees for the "Scout-O-Rama" program are two from the Farmington area. Richard Kosmenschky is serving as show stage manager and Robert W. Merrow as show moderator.

Tickets for the program, 25,000 of them, are now available from any Boy Scout or Explorer Scout in Ottawa District communities. The District covers south Oakland County south of M-39 including the area from Keego Harbor to Farmington and from Highland to South Lyon.

Brown moved that the Supervisor be authorized to investigate the matter of proof of claim on all future statements submitted to the Board as required by statute.

During the question and answer period which followed the meeting, it was suggested that Albert Galt be retained as Building Inspector. Stephenson stated that any action by the Board at this time would be out of order since the meeting was adjourned. The question was raised regarding the status and pay schedule for the newly appointed Electrical and Plumbing inspectors, Floyd A. Cairns, Township Clerk was accused of evading previous inquiries from the inspectors as to when they would be paid and on what basis. Cairns denied the charge and outlined the procedure for payment. Stephenson stated that he would clear the matter up immediately. A question was also raised on the status of the sealed bids for rubbish pick-up in the Township. One of the bidders claimed that he was identified as a bidder to another prospective rubbish contractor by the Clerk. Cairns stated that there was nothing irregular in this since the sealed proposals were not opened and will not be opened until the next meeting.

Stephenson stated that it is his intention to form committees within the Board to assist in the handling of detailed matters. He added that he also plans to call on the presidents of the various civic and suburban associations to discuss various problems and to obtain suggestions and recommendations.

and school property to a vote of the people at the School Election on June 10.

Five different schemes for the proposed addition at the Bond School, submitted by representatives of the John Allen architectural firm were reviewed by the Board. The scheme calling for the addition of an extra large classroom room in which two classes might be conducted as well as a multi-purpose room, storage space and toilet facilities was approved by the Board with minor changes. The addition will be made on the southwest corner of the building. The architects were instructed to proceed with plans. In separate action the Board recinded a previous motion to retain the Emmerring & Calkins architectural firm for work on a proposed kindergarten and multi-purpose room addition at the Middlebelt School and entered into a contractual agreement with J. MacDonald Jacob and Associates for the same work.

Purchase of a ten acre school site south of the Grand River Cut-Off and east of Farmington Road was approved and authorization given for the payment of \$35,000 to the Time Land Company for the parcel. In a report on school sites it was indicated that several of the other elementary school sites are now being cleared and that negotiations are being continued for other desired sites.

Payment of \$1,000 to the City of Farmington for connection of the new William Grace school sewer system to the city's sewer line on Shiloh Road was approved as was a requested rate of 22 cents per 1,000 cubic feet of water consumption. The Board also authorized the payment of \$3,734 for required changes determined necessary on footings and mechanical work on the new Junior high building.

Following discussion, authorization was given to proceed with plans for the installation of two baseball backstops at the senior high athletic field and fencing around the football field and track area. The contract for the backstops was awarded to F. D. and Sons for a total of \$1,000 and the fencing contract to Cyclone Fence Company for \$5,842. Money for these two projects will be taken from the building and site fund, possible action by the State High School elections, recommended by a committee from the newly organized School Citizens Advisory Board, was approved by the Board. It was stipulated in the resolution approved, however, that machines would only be used when it was impractical to do so.

In general discussion the present insurance coverage and building appraisals of schools in the School District were reviewed by the Board with Kenneth Loomis, insurance agent for the school system, Loomis pointed out that detailed appraisals of all school buildings were being made for insurance purposes but that no attempt was made to appraise contents. Estimated values of contents are given by the school administration, he indicated.

In order to determine how accurate present appraisals of building contents are, the Board, in order to increase the liability insurance coverage for passengers on school buses was accepted favorably. Action was withheld, however, until the exact increase in premiums which would be required is determined.

It is estimated that the additional millage will raise approximately \$200,000 this fiscal year.

Additional budget expenditures include improvement of the bridge on Powers and Farmington Roads, reticulating of older streets in the major street system, additional off-street parking facilities, increased library appropriation and re-appraisal of property in the city. It is estimated that a cash balance of \$40,000 will be carried over into the new budget. These are received from the sale of city-owned land during the past year.

The city has refused to accept a check from the Highway Department in the amount of \$16,250 on the grounds that the option between the Department and the City has expired.

HOW ABOUT A SCREEN TEST?

I heard the other day about a resident in these parts who is finding that middle age sag is playing havoc with his golf game these days.

He hasn't actually developed a real tummy, but is having quite a bit of trouble teeing off. If he puts the ball where he can hit it, he can't see it, and if he puts it where he can see it, he can't hit it!

It seems to me that most of us get in the same sort of fix with things that are used in summer and stored in winter.

Like window screens, for instance. When we remember they need repairing, we use them, and when we're not using them, we forget they need repairing.
