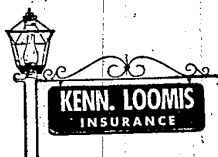


Mr. and Mrs. Bruce Wendland of Lansing are the proud parents of a new baby daughter.

In writing including names and addresses. It was moved that the question of a proposed amendment be referred to the Township Attorney for study and that the request for written complaints be granted. The Board also approved the appointment of Dr. Broadman as Health Officer for the coming year. Upon the recommendation of the Township Planning Committee, the Board authorized the Township Attorney to prepare declarations of intent to rezone two parcels in the Township. The first involves the proposed rezoning from residential to commercial of a nine acre plot at the southeast corner of Haledale and 13 Mile Roads. The second concerns the rezoning of the property where the Grand Bell Cleaners is located on Middlefield from residential to commercial. It is presently a non-conforming use. A petition, signed by the necessary 65% of the property owners of Franklin Knolls Subdivision, was presented to the Board requesting establishment of a special assessment district for the paving of streets within the subdivision. It was moved that the request be forwarded to the County Road Commission authorizing them to proceed with the engineering and cost estimates for the project. The Board approved a motion granting a contract to Gus McCree for the monthly collection of trash in the Township at a cost of \$9,600 per year. A total of two bids were received for the collection work. The contract was granted for a two year period. Action on two proposed amendments to the zoning ordinance for providing increased lot sizes in Residential 3 and 4 zones was deferred back to the Township Attorney for further study. It was suggested that a clause be included in the amendment to exclude properties already platted.

The Handyman's NOTEBOOK

"GOOD FENCES MAKE GOOD NEIGHBORS"

That was the way the poet Robert Frost put it a good many years ago, but he could have been talking about today's trend in fences.

You don't have to be very old to remember when a fence was seldom more than an ugly structure of high boards, pickets or wire. But today people are using much more imagination in their fence-building, and they are not afraid to experiment with the different—basket-weaves, horizontal and vertical louvers, plywood panels and many, many others.

People often come to us asking our advice about fence designs, and we always try to stress that you solve your first and most important question about the design when you answer the question, "Why do you want a fence?"

If it's to keep small youngsters in and stray dogs out, you'll obviously want a type of fence that children cannot easily climb and dogs cannot get through. If you merely want it as a means of marking the boundary between your lot and your neighbors, you might prefer a long, low, open fence, such as a ranch style or a split rail.

If it's intended to provide privacy and or shelter from the wind, you may decide that louvers or panels are the best answer.

Whatever style you choose, you'll be happier with it if you give the question a lot of thought, making sure you have chosen something that pleases your eye, blends well with your house and lot, and does the job for which it was intended.

sentative on the Zoning Board of Appeals.

A unanimous approval of a plan for the development of a subdivision on the east and west side of Farmington Road between Shawwassee and 10 Mile Roads was tabled pending further study. The Planning Commission has recommended that the plat be tentatively approved subject to specific changes which have been made by the developers. The changes include a park area, increased flood plain along the river and limitations on basements in the lower elevation areas.

A letter was read to the Council from M. H. Sitts, 22490 Floral, citing the advantages of multiple dwellings in the City and urging the Council to approve the requested rezoning of property at Shawwassee and Mooney for that purpose. The rezoning request will be decided by the Council on Monday, May 6.

facilities in the existing building to determine whether they can be expanded economically to serve the proposed addition.

In a discussion on new school sites the Board generally agreed that immediate steps must be taken to locate a site in the vicinity of Holly Hill Subdivision and the new Glenbrook Subdivision where homes are now being erected. It was also agreed that a meeting should be held with the owners of property of a proposed site south of Warner Farms Subdivision and north of the Grand River Cut-Off in an effort to reach a purchase agreement. A special meeting for this purpose was called for Monday, May 6.

Authorization was given to increase the present bodily injury and liability coverage of persons riding in school motor vehicles, as recommended earlier. The action followed the reading of a letter from Kenneth Loomis, school system insurance agent, indicating that only a minor increase in rates would be required by the increase.

Approval was given for slight changes in original plans for the new William Grace School. Approval was also given to a request by Superintendent Dunkel, that the Board Secretary be authorized to sign any application seeking permission for an advance in State Aid and/or for borrowing against tax anticipation.

In other action the Board approved the appointment of 14 new teachers and the appointment of Martinus Van Amedy, principal at Southfield High, as new assistant superintendent in charge of instruction. Also approved was the awarding of a general education development diploma to John D. Moss.

A formal resolution officially naming the new junior high the O. E. Dunkel Junior High School was unanimously approved by the Board.
