Blood Needed For TB Patients, Says Health Head

A pint of blood donated can mean renewed hope for a tuberculosis patient in need of surgery, John Bernier, health educator for the Tuberculosis and Health Society, stated.

The TB and Health Society maintains a credit at the American Red Cross for the assistance of needy TB patients.

"We need approximately 300 pints of blood each year to make sure that there is enough to serve those who need it so desperately. That supply is almost exhausted," Mr. Bernier stated.

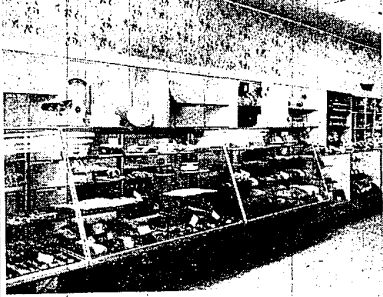
While modern drug treatments can help most cases of TB, there are those who must have an operation before there is any hope that their disease may be cured. A patient needs between five and seven pints of blood for surgery.

Every effort is made to obtain donations of blood from friends and relatives of the patient, but often there are those who have no one close to them who can help. These are the people that need help.

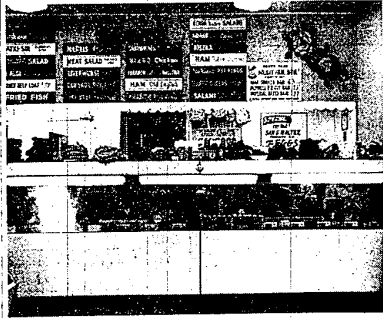

State Farm Offering New Auto Insurance

Local State Farm Mutual Automobile Insurance Company agent, Chet Rayner disclosed this week a new auto insurance policy carrying a major medical payments optional coverage.

This is the first adaptation in the auto insurance field of a catastrophe protection principle widely used in modern group health and accident plans. Five other optional coverages have been added, Rayner said, and all basic coverages of the former standard policy have been broadened to meet the realities of modern driving conditions.

Major medical expense provisions of the State Farm policy cover payment of the first \$1,000 of medical expenses resulting from an auto accident injury plus 80 per cent of additional medical expenses up to total payments of \$5,000 for each person injured. The coverage protects every member of the insured's family living in his household and there is no limit of persons so covered in any one accident.

The new policy became available locally on May 1. Five other states already have the new policy available.

The broadened basic coverages on State Farm insurance policies apply automatically to eligible policies now in force, Rayner concluded.
