NOTICE OF SPECIAL ELECTION OF THE QUALIFIED ELECTORS OF SCHOOL DISTRICT NO. 5, FRACTIONAL, OF THE TOWNSHIPS OF FARMINGTON, LIVONIA AND REDFORD, OAKLAND AND WAYNE COUNTIES, MICHIGAN

TO THE QUALIFIED ELECTORS OF SAID SCHOOL DISTRICT:

PLEASE TAKE NOTICE that a Special Election of the qualified electors of the aforesaid school district will be held in the Clarenceville High School located at 20210 Middlebelt Road in said school district on Monday, May 13, 1957, and at such Special Election the following proposition will be submitted to the qualified electors of the school district:

PROPOSITION I. MILLAGE INCREASE

Shall the limitation on the total amount of taxes which may be assessed against all property in School District No. 5, Fractional, of the Townships of Farmington, Livonia and Redford, Oakland and Wayne Counties, Michigan, for all purposes except payment of obligations incurred before December 8, 1932, be increased as provided by Section 21, Article 6 of the Constitution of Michigan, by four-tenths of one per cent (4 mills) of the assessed valuation, as equalized, of all property in the school district for a period of five (5) years from 1957 to 1961, both inclusive, to be used exclusively for the purpose of paying operational expenses of said school district?

The polls of election will be open from 7:00 o'clock a.m. to 8:00 o'clock p.m. Eastern Standard Time. Only registered voters are eligible to vote.

Each person voting on the proposition to increase the total tax-rate limitation must be a citizen of the United States, above age of twenty-one years, and have resided in the State of Michigan six (6) months and in the school district thirty (30) days next preceding the day of election.

Announcement was made this week of the awarding of Regents-Alumni Scholarship to five Farmington High School students by the University of Michigan.

Nancy Layne Beal of 7069 N. All but Beals will enter the College of Literature, Science and the Arts. Beals received his scholarship to the School of Engineering.

A total of 485 Regents-Alumni Scholarships were awarded to 485 graduating seniors in Michigan high schools. Walter B. Rea, Dean of Men and chairman of the Committee on University Scholarships, said:

These scholarships carry a stipend equivalent to semester fees for the freshman year and are renewable for the normal length of the degree program in which the student enrolls, provided his academic record justifies renewal.

The award winners were selected from 1,455 applicants representing nearly 300 high schools.

These awards are made by the Committee on University Scholarships with the assistance and advice of University alumni and alumnae and high school principals and teachers in the communities in which the applicants reside.

In evaluating the applications, the committee places special emphasis upon character, citizenship, the high school academic record, financial need, and the scores made of the competitive test written by all applicants.
