

CITY TO RECEIVE \$7,807 IN STATE HIGHWAY FUNDS

The City of Farmington will receive a total of \$7,807 as its share of the First Quarter receipts from the State gasoline and weight taxes, Charles M. Ziegler, State Highway Commissioner announced this week.

A total of \$7,339 will be received under the distribution provided for in Act 51 of the Public Acts of 1955 and \$468.98 under Act 87 of the 1955 Legislature. Under Act 51 cities and incorporated villages receive 19 per cent of the net receipts of the State Motor Vehicle Highway Fund while Act 87 covers distribution of funds derived from the increased gasoline and weight taxes which became effective June 1, 1955.

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be made to see whether the School District will be permitted to charge persons wishing to tie-in to the school main on a pro-rated basis if a six inch line is required.

Early action is necessary, it was emphasized, since water is needed at the site by building contractors. Authorization was given to proceed in obtaining cost estimates on the laying of the six inch line.

A report given by Tarapata on construction activities on the new junior high building indicated that a request has been made for an extension of time in completing the building but that it had been turned down by his architectural firm. He stated further that every effort was being made to speed up work on the building.

The tie-in to the main one of the walls of the building because of its shifting was pointed out by Tarapata and a request made that the District stand the cost of doing this. Trustee Douglas Hammill objected strongly, contending that it was the builders error in not checking subterranean conditions more thoroughly before erecting the wall. Following discussion it was moved that the wall be taken down and the condition be corrected but that payment of additional cost be withheld until a future study can be made.

Two resolutions prepared by Superintendent O. E. Duncel and presented to the Board were unanimously approved. The first spelled out conditions for receiving Federal Aid money for school construction and the second authorized the Board to agree to \$100,000 from future tax collections to meet operation expenses for the current school year if necessary. Duncel pointed out that it would not be necessary to borrow this sum from future tax collections if additional State Aid money is authorized by the Legislature and can be obtained by borrowing from future State Aid money to be allocated.

In other action, the Board approved the use of voting machines in the coming school election as well as a recommended list of 1957 graduates. The second condition was a school calendar for next year and a list of recommended textbooks prepared by the administration.

An offer by the Detroit Edison Company to sell approximately two acres of property east of the senior high site to the School District was tabled for future consideration by the Board. Action was also withheld on a request that the School Board join with property owners in seeking to have 1/4 mile Road made a primary road between Middlebelt and Northwestern.

Since a considerable amount of time was spent in reviewing building plans and discussing present school buildings under construction, many items on the regular agenda could not be discussed. The regular meeting was recessed until Friday evening at 7:30 p.m. All matters not handled at the regular meeting Monday night will be taken up at this recessed session, it was indicated.

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recommendations of the Planning Committee to amend the zoning ordinance by increasing the minimum lot area from 1/4 acre to 1/2 acre, 12,500 square feet and in R-4 zones to 20,000 square feet. The motion also provides that the minimum lot width in both zones be set at 80 feet computed at the 40 foot minimum building line. Brown objected to the motion on the grounds that it does not provide uniformity among zones and is thus illegal. Prior to approval of the motion by Trustee Elise Avery, the Board turned down an amendment by Brown that a 20,000 square foot minimum be established in all zones with the provision that liberal exceptions be granted in hardship cases.

STEPHENSON advised the Board that there might be a possibility of the Township taking back the 170 acres of land on the east side of Farmington Road between Nine and Elm Hill Roads, recently annexed by the City of Farmington. He stated that a possible loop-hole has been found authorizing the property to be returned to the Township. The Supervisor made no further explanation of the possibility.

Action was taken by the Board authorizing the employment of Fale Smith as consulting engineer for the Township on a retainer fee of \$600 per year. The Board also authorized Dr. S. A. Goodman, Township Health Officer, to proceed with condemnation of temporary dwellings located on Eight Mile east of Farmington Road.

A motion was made and approved by the Board that future building permits be denied to builders who have been cited and investigated by the Michigan Securities Commission, such denial to continue until past violations have been corrected.

The Board approved the new salary schedule, covering Township employees, as recommended by the Finance Committee. The roll call vote was five yes and two no, with Floyd A. Cairns, Township Clerk, and Clayton Gear, Township Treasurer, casting the negative votes. During the question and answer period that followed the regular agenda, William Fisher asked the Board what salary had been set for volunteer firemen. Stephenson stated that the salary was \$4.00 for the first hour and \$2.00 for each additional hour. Fisher pointed out that a motion recommending \$5.00 for the first hour and \$3.00 for each additional hour was unanimously approved at the Annual Township Meeting. The Supervisor stated that the salary schedule was discussed in detail at an executive meeting Friday, with all members of the Board participating. Fisher requested that the public be advised of the vote of each member on the firemen's salaries. It was explained that the entire Board did not vote on the proposal, but only the Finance Committee. Several members stated that numerous suggested increases were cut because of limited funds.
