APPROVE TENTATIVE RELOCATION OF MCGEE HILL RIGHT-OF-WAY

Township Delays Action On Hiring Of C.P.A. Firm

The request of Supervisor Frank Stephenson that a firm of Certified Public Accountants be employed to set up a modern system of bookkeeping in the Township as well as provide a regular auditing service was tabled until the June 7 meeting by action of the Board Tuesday evening.

The motion presented by Wendell Brown also provided that in the meantime a conference be held with the present auditor, various C.P.A. firms and the Board in order to obtain more complete information on the matter. A lengthy discussion of the proposal by various Board members followed the motion. Stephenson pointed out that since taking office he has become aware of certain things which have transpired in the Township. He said that the Township Clerk's office which emphasize the necessity for the services of a Certified Public Accountant. He added that a C.P.A. firm made a recent survey of the Township records at his request and recommended a more up-to-date system of bookkeeping.

Clayton Goos, Township Treasurer, asked Stephenson what he meant by "certain things which have transpired." The Supervisor made reference to \$17,000 paid out for water meters to be installed in the Kendallwood System, as well as certain welfare expenditures and payment of bills without the necessary supporting records. He said that the Board approved the expenditure for the water meters with the provision that the cost be paid back to the Township by Thompson-Brown and the property owners. Cairns also stated that no bills have been paid without authorization of the Board. Stephenson stated that he was not accusing Cairns of anything, but merely pointing out the need for an improved system of bookkeeping.

School Boundary Change Efforts To Be Continued

Efforts to reach agreement on the proposed straightening of the northwest and southwest boundary lines of the Farmington School District should be continued, it was determined by members of the School Board meeting Friday night in a recessed session from their regular Monday meeting.

A report made by Superintendent O. E. Dunkel indicated that Walled Lake School officials had raised some objection to the Farmington Board's earlier proposal to take over all of that portion of the Walled Lake District extending into the northwest portion of Farmington Township. They expressed opposition to giving up all of this area while receiving nothing in return, Dunkel stated. Following discussion, it was agreed that representatives of the local Board should meet with Walled Lake Board members as soon as possible to see if some compromise proposal can be worked out.

Services Held For Harry Moore

Services were held Wednesday afternoon for Harry W. Moore, former City Clerk and life-long resident of Farmington, who passed away Sunday following an extended illness.

Mr. Moore, 84 years old, served as Clerk of the City of Farmington for 18 years. He was appointed clerk on September 8, 1936, filling a vacancy caused by the resignation of Nathan Power and served continuously until September 30, 1954, when he resigned because of ill health.

Consider Adoption Of Township Dog Ordinance

Action on a proposed dog ordinance for Farmington Township, as drafted by Harry Farmer, Assistant Township Attorney, was deferred until the next Board meeting pending further examination.

Plan Intersection With Shiawassee At Athletic Field

The preliminary plan of the proposed Twin Valley Subdivision, including the relocation of North Farmington Road between Shiawassee and 10 Mile Road, were tentatively approved by the City Council at its regular meeting Monday evening.

According to the proposed subdivision layout, the new road would follow 10 Mile Road south to the curve approaching the bridge. At that point the road would continue southward on the north side of the river to an intersection with Shiawassee just east of the present bridge. The existing sharp curve of Farmington Road from Shiawassee north to the bridge will be abandoned except for traffic leading to the proposed park at the base of the hill. The bridge will be open for pedestrian use only with a vehicular turn-around provided.

Earl Scherffius, City Manager, stated that the new road suggested by officials of the State Highway Department who surveyed the traffic situation at the request of the City. The proposed relocation of Farmington Road would be constructed by the subdivider according to city specifications. It is proposed that the new road conform to the existing 66 foot right-of-way with a merging traffic interchange at Shiawassee. Scherffius stated that additional right-of-way will be secured from the property of the Farmington School District on the north side of Shiawassee just east of the bridge. The City Manager added, however, that initial conversations with school officials were favorable.

SCHERFFIUS stated that, in his opinion the new plan provided an excellent solution to the dangerous McGee Hill problem and recommended that the City give tentative approval to the proposal. He added that in addition to eliminating the present hazard, it will save the city considerable expense in the relocation of the road on the existing bridge. The 1957-58 budget includes an item of \$7,500 for widening of the bridge right-of-way.
