Summer Education Courses Planned At Camp Oakland

Interested teachers and residents of Oakland and Macomb counties are invited to enroll in 11 Michigan State University courses at Pontiac and Camp Oakland this summer, officials stated.

Four Camp Oakland classes will begin June 20 and run to August 17. Three Pontiac courses will begin June 24, three will start July 8 and one July 22. All 11 offer either graduate or undergraduate credit.

"Through the cooperation of the juvenile division of the Oakland County Probate Court and area school officials, Michigan State is able to offer courses designed for teachers working toward certification or advanced degrees," declared Dr. Howard A. Newell, acting director of the M.S.U. Continuing Education Service. "These courses," he explained, "are offered in response to area requests."

Four courses at Camp Oakland available for a maximum of nine term-hours, include: "Problems in Education," "Counseling Tools and Techniques," "Guidance Practices in the Schools," and "Mental Health of School Children." Problems in Education offers variable credit from 2 to 6. The others offer three credits.

Camp Oakland classes will begin June 20 and continue until August 17. Mondays through Saturdays, from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m.

"Diagnosis of Reading Difficulties," "Workshop on Unit Teaching Methods" and "Special Problems in Speech Correction for Administrators" will each begin June 24 and end July 3. All three courses will be held Monday through Friday from 8 to 11 a.m.

"Workshop on Reading Methods," "Workshop on Home, School and Community Relations" and "Social Control of the Mentally Handicapped" will be offered from July 8 to July 19. The reading method course will be held from 9 to 11 a.m.; as will the social control class. The community relations course will meet from 1 to 4 p.m. The course about the mentally handicapped will meet from 8 to 11 a.m. All will meet Monday through Friday.

"Materials and Methods of Audiovisual Instruction" to be taught Monday through Friday from July 22 to August 2, will meet from 10 to 11 a.m. All Pontiac courses will carry three term-credits.

Plan For Record Holiday Traffic

All available city and township police officers will be subject to call in case of emergency during the coming Memorial Day weekend, officials announced Monday.

The extra precautions are being taken in anticipation of a record flow of traffic through the Grand River corridor during the holiday weekend. Local police will be supported by additional personnel from the County Sheriff's Office and the State Police. City Police Chief Joseph DeVriendt and Township Police Chief Irving Yakes stated that regular schedules will be maintained, however, off-duty policemen will be subject to call in case any emergency arises.

As a result of the closing of the Cut-Off, an extra heavy concentration of traffic is expected along Grand River through the city. DeVriendt stated that the light at the intersection of Grand River and Farmington Road will be manually operated if necessary in order to keep traffic moving. State Police personnel are also expected to devote special attention to the Cut-Off area, particularly in the Farmington area.

Summer Swim Classes Planned For All Ages

Highlighting the summer activities program to be sponsored by the Northwest Y.W.C.A. will be swim classes for girls and women. The classes will be held at the Bryan Parks in Rouge Park from June 24 through July 26 on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays.

The program is designed for all age groups and every type of swimmer. For the more advanced swimmer, special Y.W.C.A. instructors will be offered in which qualified swimmers will have an opportunity to polish their own swimming and receive supervised teaching instruction.

A special mother-small fry class will be offered on Friday mornings from 10 to 11. This class is open to children (both boys and girls) beginning at 2½ years and their mothers.

For girls 2 up to 12 years of age, there will be classes on Monday and Wednesday mornings from 9 to 10 o'clock.

Classes will be held for girls 12 years and over as well as adults on Monday and Wednesday mornings from 10 to 11 o'clock.

The advanced and synchronized classes will be featured on Friday mornings from 9 to 10 o'clock.

All participants in the program are required to have a current Y.W.C.A. membership. A medical waiver is also required for anyone desiring to enroll in the program. Clarencville concluded another baseball season last Friday by downing Northville, 2-2. The win gave the Trojans undisputed possession of the W.O.C.I. baseball crown for the sixth straight year. In winning the title the Trojans suffered only one defeat while posting nine wins.

Leland Turnbull chalked up his sixth win by allowing Northville only 2 hits. Dan Calgrove continued to be Clarencville's lead-inning batter and was rewarded Saturday by receiving a letter from Johnny McElaine, Detroit Tiger General Manager, inviting him to attend a try-out with the Tigers.

Begin Survey On Higher Education Needs In Area

Parents in the Farmington area are urged to return to the schools with their children the questionnaires being distributed by Michigan State University through local public schools to determine the higher education needs in Oakland and Macomb counties.

The questionnaires are being sent to the homes with students, grades 2, 10 and 12.

More than 100,000 questionnaires are being distributed in the two counties to parents, teachers and students. Youths in 10th and 12th grades have been asked to express their views on post-high school education and occupations.

The completed questionnaires will be relayed back to Michigan State through the county superintendents of schools. M.S.U. will tabulate results during the summer months.

Information sought through the two-county survey will help M.S.U. in its completed grant at the Meadow Brook estate near Pontiac and also will aid junior college study committees in the two counties.

School officials are especially interested in the questionnaires from the parents, it was indicated. Parents' views will help in conducting high school programs, adult education activities and, certainly, developments in the junior college area. The parents are asked questions dealing with: (1) How far do you want your child to go in school? (2) What plans do you have for your child to continue beyond high school? (3) What type of careers would you expect your child to pursue? and others.

The survey will include other adults later this summer.

The gift of the Meadow Brook estate and a \$2,000,000 grant at the time from Mr. and Mrs. Alfred G. Wilson was accepted last January by the governing board of Michigan State. Local advisory committees are advancing plans for the projected branch at the estate.

Then there are the two big features of the 42nd night, the \$15,000 added Motor City Pace for aged pacers on June 27 and the \$10,000 added Transamerica Pace on July 3, for four and five-year-olds.
