**Map Of Area Parks Available**

Additional recreational facilities were opened in Huron-Clinton Metropolitan Authority Parks on Memorial Day, Thursday, May 30. A new color map of the Authority's parks and parkways in the counties about Detroit is available free, as is a new map of Kensington Metropolitan Park. These may be secured at park headquarters or the Detroit office, 1750 Guardian Building, Woodward 1-5865.

Kensington Metropolitan Park on U.S. 16 near New Hudson has opened its bathing beach on Kent Lake and the excursion boat, "Island Queen," is now making hourly trips from 12 to 7 p.m. on week-ends and holidays and is available for charter at other times. Daily hourly trips will start June 8. Boat rental dock hours will be extended from 8 a.m. to 8 p.m. to 8 a.m. to 10 p.m. starting Memorial Day.

A new Nature Center Building with a variety of exhibits is open week days from 2 to 4 p.m. Saturdays from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. and Sundays from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. Appointments for guided tours of the building and also for field trips may be made through the Detroit office.

The new five-county "Metropark Guide" covers Wayne, Washtenaw, Livingston, Oakland and Macomb counties, showing both H-C-M-A and state parks on a large-scale map and detail maps of the H-C-M-A parks on the reverse side.

**PICNIC HAMS.**
