County Historical Society To Place Old Canal Marker

Dedication of a marker commemorating the Clinton-Kalamazoo canal will highlight the annual meeting of the Oakland County Historical Society to be held at Bloomer State Park No. 2 at Rochester on Wednesday, June 26. A basket lunch at noon will begin the program. Presentation of the marker by the Michigan Historical Commission will follow the picnic lunch.

The marker is one of a series being erected by the Michigan Historical Commission under a marking program begun a year ago. In addition to the legend telling the story of the canal, the marker will have a map showing the proposed route of the canal from Mt. Clemens through Oakland County and across southern Michigan. Remains of the canal are still visible along some portions of its route. Markers have already been erected in several communities throughout the state and others are now ready for dedication during the summer months. It is anticipated that 49 sites will have been marked by Labor Day.

The Oakland County Historical Society is composed of residents from various parts of the county who are concerned with preserving the traditions and history of their own community. Anyone interested is welcome to attend the meeting and dedication. Willard Wichers, of Holland, president of the Michigan Historical Commission, Mrs. Donald E. Adams of Drayton Plains, vice president, and George May, of the Commission staff will participate in the presentation of the marker.

Officers and directors of the Oakland County Historical Society will be selected at the annual meeting according to Ernest Huthwaite, president. Serving on the nominating committee are Mrs. Maudie Place, Jessie Brewer and Arthur Selden. Mrs. Whitney Prall and Carl Bird are in charge of notification. The board of directors, which has members from various parts of the county, is in charge of general arrangements.

Pontiac Marine Platoon Now Being Recruited

The United States Marine Corps Recruiting Service in Pontiac, Michigan is again enlisting a special unit of Michigan Men into a select group called the "Pontiac Marine Platoon."

The "Pontiac Marine Platoon" will be transferred to the Marine Corps Recruit Depot, San Diego, California on June 28 for recruiting training. The unit will be composed entirely of men from Michigan.

Applicants are being accepted for enlistments in the "Pontiac Marine Platoon" until June 27.

Upon enlistment men are sent to the Marine Corps Recruiting Station at Detroit for processing, then sent home to await the call to active duty.

To enlist in the "Pontiac Marine Platoon" a man must be between the ages of 17 and 28. Men 17 years of age must have the parents' consent. All men must furnish a birth certificate before enlisting.

The enlistment period in the Marine Corps is two, three, or four years.

State Deer Kill Down Slightly

Michigan firearm deer hunters bagged more than 73,500 whitetails during regular and special seasons last year, according to the recently-completed Conservation Department analysis of hunter report cards.

The regular season kill accounted for 60,540 bucks, while another 12,950 deer were taken in special seasons in designated areas.

Some 429 deer hunters were afield during the "bucks only" season and approximately 42,000 permit holders hunted during the special seasons.

The total kill of 73,590 deer compared with 73,620 taken during the 1955 season when only bucks were legal targets. Statistical estimates last fall indicated a kill of 70,000 deer in 1956, slightly under the actual figure.

The deer killed last year were recorded in the upper peninsula and the northern lower peninsula. The U.P. buck harvest dropped from 29,160 in 1955 to 24,220 last fall. In the northern lower peninsula, 34,240 bucks were taken during the regular season last fall, compared with 41,930 in 1955.

The deer bag also dipped slightly in the southern lower peninsula, from 2530 to 2450 last year, but fewer hunters were afield in this region and the percentage of hunter success actually was higher in 1956.

Information for the deer season summary is obtained from post card questionnaires which were mailed to a random sample group of hunters earlier this year. Final returns from the annual survey were processed by statisticians recently.
