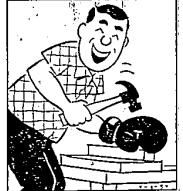

Participates In Big Navy Fleet Exercise

U.P. Still Rich In Iron Ore

Upper peninsula mines, suppliers of iron ore for more than a century, promise to continue as an important factor in the economy of Michigan and the nation.

Millions of tons of high-grade iron ore have been shipped from the U.P. in the last 110 years, but it is low-grade ore which may hold the real promise for the future. Modern beneficiation and mining methods, to utilize the low-grade ores, will do much to meet the increasing demands of industry for steel.

Economists predict that steel companies will be using 150 million tons of ore by 1965 and 200 million tons by 1980. By way of contrast, 124 million tons were used in 1954.

Upper peninsula known reserves of high-grade ore—called "direct shipping ore"—would be exhausted in another 10 or 15 years, at the present rate of use. Of course, further explorations undoubtedly will reveal additional supplies of high-grade ore.

Geologists, however, estimate there are some two billion tons of low-grade ore in the first 100 feet below ledge in the Michigan iron ranges. This reserve might provide as much iron ore as has been shipped from the state in the last 110 years.

These low-grade reserves already are being mined on both the Marquette and Menominee ranges and the operations are expanding. Iron mining, the backbone of Michigan's mining industry, can be expected to maintain its position for many years to come.

Completing Plans For Polio Clinic

Final preparations are now being made for the Polio Immunization Clinic to be held Monday, June 24, from 7 to 9 p.m. at the Bond School.

Dr. Sylvan A. Broadman, Township Health Officer, will be in charge of the clinic being given under the sponsorship of the Bond and Eagle School PTA groups. Dr. Broadman will administer polio injections to any child or adult living in the Farmington School District at a fee of \$1.00 per injection.

It is required that children be accompanied by one of their parents.

Since the clinic will be for the entire area and the supply of vaccine is limited, injections will be given on a "first come, first serve" basis, chairman of the clinic project indicated.

Parents are urged to bring the entire family, if none have as yet been vaccinated, and have all protected prior to the peak polio season.
