Plymouth Symphony Group To Open Summer Concert Series June 30

Sunday, June 30 will mark the opening date of the Plymouth Colony Concert Series - a summer outdoor music festival. The first season will consist of three concerts, but in future years the Plymouth Symphony Society which supports and underwrites the program expects to see the program firmly established as a six-week long "festival", featuring the best in music with top-flight, nationally known soloists and artists, such as the world-famous summer series held at Tanglewood, New Jersey.

On the opening date, June 30, the Plymouth Orchestra will feature Norma Heyde, golden-voiced soprano, last heard nationally over the CBS network in its presentation of the "Messiah". Included in her numbers will be the difficult and sensitive "Summer Nights" by Berlioz.

The second program, July 21st, will be presented by the Detroit Little Symphony, assisted by the internationally known young pianist, James Wolfe. Mr. Wolfe has toured Europe and South America and is already one of the great names of the concert stages of this country. In addition to the Bach Suite No. 2 he will play the little-known Beethoven Piano Concerto No. 2.

The final concert, which will again be presented by the Plymouth Symphony Orchestra, will be held on August 11, and will have as its soloist Paul Olefsky, first cellist of the Detroit Symphony, whose brilliant performances will be heard in the works of Violdi and Tchaikovsky.

Plan Eye Bank At U.M. Hospital

University Hospital at the University of Michigan will establish an eye bank in cooperation with individual Lions Clubs in this state it was disclosed at the Michigan Lions convention held the latter part of May.

Eyes donated to the bank will be used for cornea transplants to restore sight to Michigan residents with diseases of the cornea.

The Ann Arbor Lions Club whose primary service function is sight restoration approached the University with the proposition to establish the bank. Under the agreement made, the various Lions Clubs in Michigan will support costs of the bank and obtain pledges for the donation of eyes after death from persons in their communities.

According to Dr. John Henderson, U.M. associate professor of ophthalmology it is hoped that an office will be ready at the Hospital to receive the donation of pledges by Sept. 25 of this year. University Hospital will provide the space and medical personnel for the bank and utilize the eye material.

Initially the bank will only accept donation pledges from persons within a 50 mile radius of Ann Arbor as it will be necessary for a doctor from the hospital to remove the eyes from donors within two hours after death. This area includes all or parts of Washtenaw, Lenawee, Jackson, Monroe, Oakland, Livingston, Ingham and Wayne Counties.

Dr. Henderson expressed hope that practicing ophthalmologists will become interested in the program and volunteer to obtain eyes in their own communities when a donor dies. He added that it is very necessary that eyes be removed under the same sanitary conditions that exist in the hospital operating room.

After the eye is removed it is packed in a special refrigerated sterile thermos container. It can last as long as 48 hours under this condition. Eyes will be used only for corneal transplants in patients with disease of the cornea. The transplants will be made at University Hospital.

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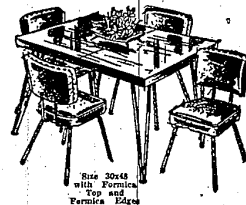

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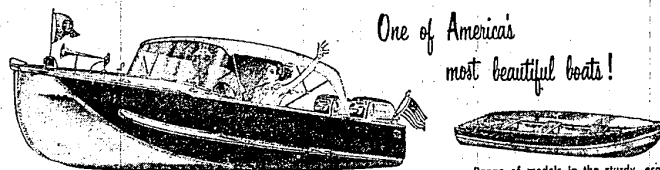
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
