## Permit Given To Start Lamphrey Control Tests

Conservation Department Director Gerald E. Eddy this week issued a permit allowing the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service to undertake experimental chemical treatment of certain Michigan streams in an effort to destroy sea lamprey spawn and adult lampreys.

The permit was issued to Dr. J. W. Moffett, in charge of the Service's Great Lakes fisheries investigations. Dr. Moffett has been conducting laboratory experiments with chemicals for a number of years, searching for a substance which will destroy lamprey larvae in streams without harming fish.

## Local Police Chief Urges Caution While Boating

With the 4th of July holiday close at hand, Chief of Police Irving H. Yakes today voiced a timely new suggestion to save lives over the long weekend—and all summer.

"Many of our citizens will be among the thirty millions of Americans of all ages who enjoy the invigorating and pleasant sport of boating. It is one of the best forms of recreation, yet just as 'hot-rod jockeys' and 'drag-race show-offs' so does boating have a few smart-alecks who imperil the safety of themselves and others," he declared.

Chief Irving H. Yakes added that "out of a desire to curb the outlandish and exhibitionistic behavior of this reckless minority has shown a new idea. 'Thumbs Down Means Don't Clown.' The objective is simply to discourage dangerous antics by giving the family 'Thumbs Down' gesture to the offender."

Public safety authorities suggest that whenever you see a person who makes a pest of himself by clowning on a boat or in an auto on the highway, you can give the sign — universally recognized signal of disapproval. When he sees you make this sign, he'll know he's doing something he shouldn't do. He'll know that others know it, too. If, in common with the vast majority, he's a true sportsman, he will stop his foolishness and act like a gentleman.

So — let's all remember "Thumbs Down Means Don't Clown!" Also, when towing a boat, don't forget to have proper lights on trailer and to drive extra careful.

## Record Number Of Deer Taken With Bow-Arrow

Archery deer hunters bagged a record total of 2420 whitetails during 1956 hunting season, according to recent estimates based on the Conservation Department's annual post card poll of hunters.

The previous high for bow and arrow hunters was in 1955, when 2310 deer were taken. Archery deer license sales also established a new record, with 42,368 sold; and nonresident permits sold better the previous high of 37,200 in 1955.

## Plans Progress For Auto Races At Northville

Plans are now moving forward for the first open car mile race to be held in Michigan this year, the Northville 100 at the half-mile track at Northville Downs, on July 4. Promoter Mel Larson indicated this will be the first time for such a race in the Detroit area on a half-mile dirt track, Larson commented.

The wide, semi-banked turns will allow for high speeds on this oval and the new cars (56 and 57 models) should reach a speed of 90 to 95 miles per hour on the straightaways.

Larson stated that fences and guard rails would be added and re-inforced for maximum protection for drivers and spectators. The track surface will be being prepared about ten days in advance to guarantee an absolute minimum of dust.

Larson further stated that arrangements had been made with a representative from Toledo, Ohio, for a fireworks display to be held that evening in celebration of the 4th.

Time trials for the 24 starting positions in the main event will begin at 7:00 p.m. A three lap trophy dash will be held promptly at 7:30 between the fastest qualifying Ford, Chevrolet and Plymouth automobile. This will be followed by two ten-lap heat races and the 100-lap feature event.

## Plan Family Vacation Trip Says Authority

Wondering how to keep the kids happy and occupied on the family vacation? Plan ahead and family traveling can be fun, says Mary Hixon, Oakland County Home Demonstration Agent.

Short trips are most fun for small children, so try to select a spot within one or two days of easy driving. Long journeys are usually wearing, but may be made easier by frequent rest stops in parks and "stretching" by avoiding traveling during the heat of the day; or by traveling entirely by night when children can sleep in the back of the car.

Success of your trip with tiny ones will depend on how well you have planned the little things that count. They include food, clothing, games, first aid equipment and sleeping and play arrangements.

Here's a check list: Snacks—these may include crackers, sandwiches, dried fruits and lemonade. Clothes—choose comfortable and cool garments to wear. Carry along wet washcloths in an insulated bag for cooling off. Also a box of cleansing tissue comes in handy. Some of the newer tissues come with a mild cleansing agent right in the tissue.

First aid—carry medical kits in the car for minor accidents and emergencies. Singing as a form of making up "round-robin" stories are fun for all.

Toys—pack a suitcase of these. Preschool children might enjoy blocks, small building blocks and little cars. All children like puzzles and story books. Or, you might take along some modeling clay or homemade clay.

## Over 660 Fishing Sites Acquired

Michigan's public fishing site program, established in 1940, is paying big dividends now for sportsmen.

During the last 16 years, more than 660 fishing sites have been acquired for public use on lakes and streams throughout the state. These sites assure access to fishable waters for anglers and their boats.

The recreational opportunities provided by the program have grown more important each year as the number of fishermen increases while water frontage becomes more expensive and less available, conservationists pointed out.

Many Michigan lakes would be closed to public use if access were not provided by development of a state-owned fishing site.

Most of the present sites were purchased by the Conservation Department with money from the Game and Fish Protection Fund. The Fund, which also is used to purchase hunting lands for public use, is created by revenue from fishing and hunting licenses.

Other public fishing sites have been acquired by the state through exchanges, gifts and tax reversions.

Each year, available water frontage is studied and a number of selected sites are purchased to expand the program, providing needed recreational facilities.

In addition, public access to fishing waters is provided by public forests, game areas, parks and recreation areas.

A complete listing of the state's public fishing sites can be obtained by dropping a card to the Conservation Department Fish Division, Lansing 26.

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## Plan Auto Races At Northville

Two late model auto races will be run at the Northville Downs race track this summer, it was disclosed last week.

Mel Larson, a native of Plymouth, has leased the track and will sponsor the races. A race driver of jalopies, modifieds, mid-guts and late model cars, Larson has also edited and published his own magazine and produced, directed and emceed his own TV show for racing associations. Handling promotion and publicity for four race tracks, he also has written for national racing papers.

The first race will be held on July 4 and will be known as the Northville 100. Racing will begin at 7:00 p.m. and will be the first of a series of races. The racing association, Time trails will be held at 8:30 p.m. with a three lap trophy dash followed by two ten lap hot races and a 100 lap feature event over the half mile oval.

The second race will be with convertibles and will be run either late in August or early in September.

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
