Church Going Number Hits Record High

Church attendance in the United States during 1957 is off to a record start. The most recent Gallup Poll reported 52,886,610 Americans attending churches and synagogues regularly compared with 49,600,000 in late 1955. Adult attendance at worship services has increased 11 per cent in the last seven years, according to the survey.

The increase is partially credited to the Religion in American Life movement which was organized in 1950 to emphasize the importance of religion in personal and community life. It is sponsored by a member's committee composed of leaders of the major faiths and is supported by 24 national religious bodies. RIAL campaigns are held annually in thousands of American communities under local sponsorship. Each year since RIAL began its work, church attendance has steadily grown.

"It is very significant that the Gallup Poll also notes that worship attendance last year hit a high point in November, the month of greatest concentration of the RIAL campaign," said Robert T. Stevens, executive chairman of the RIAL and former Secretary of the Army.

The theme of this year's Religion in American Life campaign will be "Find the Strength for Your Life . . . Worship Together This Week." The campaign will be conducted in November.

Following the close of Bible School, many of the boys and girls will be attending Camp Michigan for one and two-week periods.
