Authority Parks Ready For July 4

All five parks in the Huron-Clinton Metropolitan Authority system are in readiness for record-breaking crowds on Thursday, July 4, and the following week-end. Director Kenneth L. Hallenbeck said this week.

"We will have peak staffs and we anticipate no over-crowding even if attendance approaches last year's highs of 50,000 at Kensington Metropolitan Park or 35,000 at one time at Metropolitan Beach," Hallenbeck said.

"Our biggest problem is traffic on state highways leading to the parks, but that is to be improved shortly," he added.

Huron-Clinton Metropolitan Authority parks are Kensington Metropolitan Park, 4,500 acres near New Hudson, Dexter-Huron Metropolitan Park near Ann Arbor, Lower Huron Metropolitan Park near Belleville, Marshwood Metropolitan Park on Cass Lake near Pontiac, and Metropolitan Beach, world's largest freshwater beach park, on Lake St. Clair.

Questions Farmington Road Re-Routing

Gentlemen: We have noted in the Farmington Enterprise a proposal to eliminate the present hazardous routing of Farmington Road on McGee Hill.

While we are wholly in favor of remedying the present dangerous situation, in our opinion the proposed remedy falls far short of our future needs, and will probably develop a traffic bottleneck as threatening as the present danger.

Upon the paving of Farmington Road north of Ten Mile Road, and the further evolution of northern residential areas, traffic on Farmington Road north of the city will be multiplied. To propose a routing which will result in a "Y" intersection at the foot of the hill on Shawwassee, between Warner and Powers Road, presents a picture of future traffic congestion which is grim to contemplate.

All Farmington Road traffic would approach the intersection with the need for conflicting right and left hand turns, creating a type of situation which most communities are striving to eliminate. According to the proposal, the only logical access to the intersection through traffic would be via Powers Road, Warner Avenue and Farmington Road south of Shawwassee. To force all of this traffic onto Shawwassee, and then attempt to feed it through such a "Y" intersection, would appear to be impractical.

It would seem more promising to reroute Farmington Road directly to the Powers Road, Shawwassee intersection; or better yet, to improve the bridge and routing of McGee Hill to feed directly onto Farmington Road. This latter proposal could be accomplished by utilizing unoccupied property to move the intersection of Farmington Road and Ten Mile farther east. This would permit an approach to a new and wider bridge, without the present hazardous curve at the foot of McGee Hill.

In the interest of the safety of present and future citizens we appeal for further consideration instead of grasping at a solution which will be inadequate for our future needs.
