be ready for review by the latter part of July.

A topographical survey of the elementary school site between Westbrook and Kendallwood No. 2 subdivisions was submitted to the Board by Earl Meyers, architect. Meyers was instructed to draw up special as well as conventional plans for a school at the site, incorporating in the special plans any possible features where costs might be reduced. A meeting in a special session with major contractors on the new O.E. Dunkel Junior High, a complete review was made of a previously drawn up progress schedule. All contractors agreed that work on the classroom portion of the school could be completed by September 1 but emphasized the fact that it would not be possible if any unforeseen difficulties were encountered. Another meeting with the contractors has been set for July 22 to determine whether work is still progressing on schedule at this time.

Superintendent O.E. Dunkel informed the Board that the plan submitted by the County Board of Education on proposed boundary line changes at both the northwest and southeast corners of the School District are scheduled for either July 18 or 19. A formal request made by Andre Hansen of Haggerty Road that his youngsters be permitted to continue their education in the Farmington School system was tabled for further consideration. The Hansen home is located in that portion of the School District which was recently transferred to the Novi District.

In discussion on school sites, the Board requested that immediate steps be taken to complete transactions for property in the Holly Hill Subdivision area as well as for the site south of Warner Farms Subdivision and a third site south of the new expressway.

Minor damage was caused to the Edgewood and Central Elementary Schools during the past week-end as the result of vandalism. Clarenceville School officials reported Monday.

A total of 19 small windows were broken in the temporary building at the Edgewood School property Saturday evening or Sunday, officials added. There was no evidence of an attempt to enter the building Friday evening when vandals broke into the Central Elementary School on Eight Mile Road causing minor damage in one room.

Baseball For Boys --

Sixty boys plus four managers and one umpire comprise the personnel of our Little League Major organization. Two Hundred Eighty boys plus 16 managers and coaches form the farm organization of the Little League.

To further round out the farm organization this year is our newly organized 8 year old group known as Class C players, composed of about 45 boys. All of these 380 boys are classified as Little League ballplayers. All of these boys with the exception of 10 playing on the major league wear T-shirts and caps. The 4 major teams are completely outfitted with regulation baseball uniforms. These 380 boys are within the ages of 8 to 12 inclusive.

When a boy reaches the age of 13 and not older than 15, he is no longer eligible to play on the Little League ball and his summer ball activities are confined to the older group known as the Babe Ruth League. Four newly organized farm teams have been added to the Babe Ruth organization this year. This year 120 boys are playing regular scheduled Babe Ruth ball.

The Little League (380 boys) and the Babe Ruth organization (120 boys) are known as the Farmington Baseball for Boys. The Little League has a board of directors, 2 equipment managers and a roster of umpires, scorekeepers, managers, coaches and a board of directors. The Little League is a non-profit organization and its purpose is to organize and supervise this most important project. This work and supervision is a full-time spare time job. The men participating are not financially reimbursed, but there is a wealth of personal satisfaction which pays far greater dividends. The community also benefits.

It is both amazing and disheartening to the officers and personnel of this organization that about 500 boys participating every night and every Saturday afternoon from June 1 to August 1 that so many parents have shown little or no support—financially, physically or morally. Where is the interest from the parents, relatives and friends for that boy who plays participating in this sport for physical support; very few have extended themselves financially. On June 1 letters were sent to the citizens of Farmington requesting a donation to help defray the expenses to operate this enterprise. To date very little of this necessary money has been received.

Finances provide the uniforms, equipment and other necessary items but the organizers and supporters of the idea have learned that the broader aspects of the program require the physical support of the entire community—men, women and children. Support this fine civic organization; a Farmington enterprise for Farmington boys. Show your appreciation to the organizers who work hard to give our boys a summer of organized baseball.

LEGAL NOTICE

DECLARATION OF INTENT
TO AMEND THE
ZONING ORDINANCE
TOWNSHIP OF FARMINGTON
BE IT RESOLVED: That Paragraph titled "AREA OF LOT" in Section VII, Residence 4 Zones, of the Zoning Ordinance of the Township of Farmington, which reads as follows:
"AREA OF LOT: In a Residence 4 Zone, no dwelling shall be erected or used on any lot having an area of less than fifteen thousand (15,000) square feet for each family housed thereon; except that this shall not prevent the use for one family of any lot existing and of record at the time of passage of this Ordinance and having an area of less than fifteen thousand (15,000) square feet but not less than six thousand (6,000) square feet."
BE AMENDED TO READ as follows:
"AREA OF LOT: In a Residence 4 Zone, no dwelling shall be erected or used on any lot having an area of less than twenty thousand (20,000) square feet and no less than eighty (80) feet in width measured at the forty (40) foot depth building line for each family housed thereon. Provided, however, this amendment shall not apply to lots shown on approved preliminary plats and lots existing and of record prior to the date of the adoption of this amendment, and provided further that this shall not prevent the use for one family of any lot or lots existing and of record at the time of the passage of this Ordinance having a width of less than eighty (80) feet and having an area of less than fifteen thousand (15,000) square feet, but not less than six thousand (6,000) square feet."

For the purposes of this amendment an "approved preliminary plat" shall be defined as -- a map indicating the proposed layout of the subdivision in sufficient detail to provide adequate basis for review, submitted to and approved by the Township Board, and subject to the further approval of the Oakland County Road Commission and Oakland County Health Department.

A temporary basis. Prior to the Board action, Stephenson stated that in his opinion Hahnelmehl had been doing a good, honest job and recommended his permanent appointment. The Board unanimously approved the Supervisor's recommendation.

The Board accepted the offer of the County Road Commission for the replacement of new and wider culverts on Nine Mile Road west of Drake Road, 15 Mile Road between Farmington and Drake Roads and at Drake and Howard Roads. The County has agreed to stand the cost of two of the culverts provided that the Township pays for the other two. Stephenson stated that the Township can use the \$5,500 in matching funds now on deposit with the County for this project. This would leave a balance of approximately \$755 which would have to be allocated by the Board. The Board approved a motion to appropriate the additional balance and authorized the Commission to proceed with the work. They also approved a motion allocating approximately \$7,000 for ditching work in the Township and directed the Commission to begin work on the project as soon as possible.

Because of improper wording on the two proposed amendments pertaining to increased lot sizes in R3 and R4 zones, the Board rescinded its previous resolutions and adopted new resolutions as prepared by legal counsel. The new wording clarifies the fact that the amendments would not apply to lots shown on approved preliminary plats and lots existing and of record prior to the date of adoption of the amendments.

REMOVING INK SPOTS

Some inks can be removed or lightened by sponging with an ammonia solution of one tablespoon to a cup of water. Make several treatments since the color comes back when the fabric dries. This is a good method to use on silk, wool or vicara since the more effective removers damage these fabrics. 1. Remove ink spots with a dry cloth. 2. Repeated sponging with acetone will remove the spots completely. Acetone should not be used on acetate, aryl or dyel fabrics because it dissolves them.

NOTEBOOK

QUIZ FOR LAZY TYPES

Ever get an inferiority complex from watching TV shows that feature nothing but geniuses? (Or is it geni?)

I sure do. And I imagine a lot of other people react the same way. So I've devised a little quiz as sort of a morale booster. You see, with THIS quiz you can even read each answer FIRST if you want to—and then feel smug as all-get-out when you glance back at the question.

Naturally, our category is Do-it-yourself. Ready?

Q: What should be done to newly plastered walls before they are papered?

A: First, make sure the plaster is dry, then give it a coat of glue size. Then let the plaster dry for a while. (The size fills the pores of the plaster, providing a smooth surface on which to apply the paper.)

Q: How can you prevent copper screens from causing stains on window frames, etc?

A: A coat of spar varnish on both sides of the screen will do the trick. First remove the edge-molding from the screens, brush them, then varnish.

Q: What is the best way to cement floor rubber?

A: Latex-bonding cements are best, but almost any rubber-cement will do.

Q: How can you calculate the number of rolls of wallpaper needed to paper a room?

A: Measure the surface to be covered (in square feet) and divide by 30. The answer is the number of rolls you'll need.

Q: What are "wriggle nails" and what are they used for?

A: They are small pieces of flat wire that look like corrugated iron. They are often used in box-making, in picture frames and in many other things where two pieces of wood must be joined edge-to-edge.
