Nine Attending
Scout Jamboree

Nine boys from Farmington are among a group of more than 5,000 Boy Scouts, Explorers and adult leaders who will be taking part in the Fourth National Boy Scout Jamboree to be held at Valley Forge, Pennsylvania, from July 12-18.

Local boys who are attending the Jamboree are: Douglas DeGroot of 30223 Ardmore, Daniel Duquet of 2949 Orchard Lake Road, Richard Lam of 28130 Westbrook, Ronald Latham of 23300 Middlebelt, Dale Prouss of 29174 Westmont Court, Carter E. Billu of 29122 Utey Lane, Arthur Duquet of 29434 Orchard Lake, John Stever of 30300 Oronaut, and Donald Wright of 30300 West Gate.

The boys will live together by patrols and crews, cooking, putting on demonstrations, hiking and taking part in huge area shows and sectional activities in the same general area where George Washington and his army camped, lived and suffered in the bitter winter of 1778. The purpose of the jamboree is to strengthen the program of the individual unit and to provide an opportunity for boys to be associated with other scouts from all parts of their own country. The theme of the jamboree is "Onward for God and Country."

The camp site will occupy about 1,500 acres of Valley Forge Park owned and maintained by the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. During the jamboree special trains will take jamboree campers on guided tours of Philadelphia's historic landmarks. Spectacular jamboree closing and opening evening ceremonies are planned in a natural amphitheatre which can hold the entire number of scouts attending as well as several thousand guests. The stage from which performances will be given is 300 feet wide and 100 feet deep.

Boys attending the jamboree will put out their own daily newspaper as well as operating their own jamboree radio station.

Side trips before and following the jamboree will also be taken to Washington, D.C. and vicinity and to New York City. Boys will have the opportunity to tour several points of interest in the capital city as well as Arlington, Mt. Vernon and Alexandria in the area. In New York they will be on tours through the United Nations building and Empire State building.

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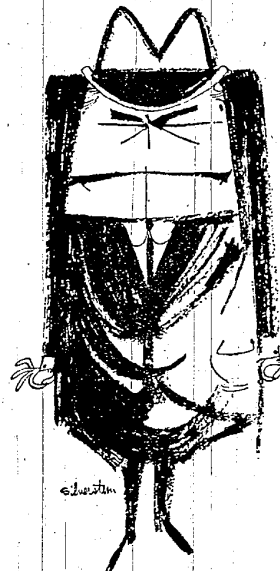
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
