Completes Chemical Course In Alabama
Pvt. Donald H. Wolfe, son of Mr. and Mrs. Edward E. Wolfe, 22400 Lilac, Farmington, recently completed the enlisted entry course at the Army's Chemical Corps School, Fort McClellan, Alabama.
The nine-week course gave Wolfe instruction in chemical decontamination, smoke generation and equipment repair.
He entered the Army last February and completed basic training at Fort Leonard Wood, Missouri. The 20-year-old soldier is a 1955 graduate of Farmington High School.

Shrubs Need Special Care First Year
The lack of rain in midsummer brings problems to shrubs and evergreens as well as lawns. Says Joseph T. Cox, extension specialist in landscape architecture at Michigan State University, "The first year is the toughest for landscape plants. They need considerably more care the first year after transplanting. Gentle soaking applications of water at least once a week will bring the best results. Less attention will be needed in later years."
Building structures and glass reflect heat strongly enough to insure plants within 3 or 4 feet from the foundation. About the only thing that can be done is to supply enough water to offset the heat. Plants should be planted out from the building if possible.
Cox suggests applying mulch on the surface around plants to conserve moisture, reduce extreme temperatures, reduce soil cracking, discourage weeds and improve soil texture during the summer months.
Burlap sun shades may be hung up on stakes to reduce the mid-day sun on plants that show signs of heat injury such as dry and falling leaves.

Prepare Child For Operation, Says U.M. Doctor

Your child is going to have an operation and you want to save him and yourself some unnecessary grief and misunderstanding, take time to prepare him for his experiences and stay in the hospital, a University of Michigan pediatrician advises.
Dr. James L. Wilson, chairman of the Department of Pediatrics and Communicable Diseases at University Hospital states that if parents are honest with the child, and try to explain things to him in a matter of fact, simple way, he will be much happier about the whole experience and so will they. The age of the child, and how much the parents and family physician think he will be able to understand as an individual should be carefully considered, Dr. Wilson states.

Frequently, a hospital stay means being away from mother for the first time. Says Dr. Wilson, "This means that the child should be prepared for this first. Role playing may help, he adds, but remember, the child has a vivid imagination, and too much information too early may place things out of proportion in his mind."
Dr. Wilson recommends that parents consult their pediatrician or family doctor on explaining the need for an operation to Johnny. "Get it clear in your own mind as to exactly why the operation is necessary before trying to explain it to the child," he advises. He suggests that the child need not be told the whole, vivid story.
A little benevolent fibbing is not unadvisable, he adds. Be certain that you know what you are talking about.
