Candidate V. Frederick Halboth was graduated from Concordia College in Milwaukee, Wisconsin, with the class of 1952, and from Concordia Theological Seminary, St. Louis, Missouri, with the class of 1957. He served his village at St. John's Lutheran Church in Rome, New York, while in Rome, he was joined in marriage with Miss Blanche Falkowski. The young couple will make their home on Evergreen Road in Detroit.

Returning to the Birmingham area as a guest preacher at the Franklin Church in Birmingham is the Reverend Robert Wilkie who will speak at the service this Sunday, July 28, at 10:00 a.m.

Mr. Wilkie served for a time as assistant pastor at First Baptist Church in Birmingham and is now the minister to Presbyterian students at Wayne State University.

"Milky Way" Big Feature In July Sky

The Milky Way, stretching from north to south and the planets dotted across the southern sky, form the astronomical picture for July, reports Hazel M. Losh, U-M associate professor of astronomy.

"A wide glowing arch of remarkable variety and beauty, the Milky Way, spans the whole heavens and may be easily traced," Professor Losh says.

"To the unaided eye, it shines as a soft misty light," she comments, "but slight optical assistance, even binoculars or a small telescope, shows it to be made up of myriads of faint stars and nebulae."

Relating the legends concerning the Milky Way, the astronomer says, "All through the ages this broad hazy band, encircling the sky, has been observed by man. It bears many fanciful titles. But the idea of its being a pathway has been a very prevalent one, for it is easy to imagine it a starry path, a glistening river, or a heavenly oasis, or, according to an old Indian legend, stood picked up by a buffalo and horse racing across the sky."

Actually, it is believed today that the Milky Way is a great concourse of stars, star clusters, bright nebulae, star clouds, and dark dust clouds. Professor Losh comments, "Its light is due almost entirely to stars, which are too faint to be distinguished as individuals without some kind of optical aid," she continues, "so that if all naked eye stars were blotted out, the Milky Way would still shine practically unchanged upon a dark blank sphere."

Noting another interesting feature of the July skies, Professor Losh says that by the end of the month, the five brightest planets will be visible at the same time just after sunset.

The astronomer outlines the planets and their locations in the sky as Jupiter, continuing through the month a bright object in the southwest sky; Saturn, to be found well above the southeastern horizon at dark; Venus, truly an "Evening Star," bright and breaking through the western twilight, being visible from one to two hours after the sun has gone down; Mars, much fainter, to be located at the beginning of the month near and to the left or east of Venus; and Mercury, by the end of the month, joining Mars and Venus, and passing only seven minutes of arc above Mars on July 23. "The three planets, so close together, will set about an hour after the sun," the professor notes.

Tips On Removing Perspiration Stains Given

Nina Lou Baird, of Michigan State University Cooperative Extension Service, states that it is best to remove perspiration stains as soon as possible since the older the stain the harder it is to remove. A fresh stain of this kind usually can be removed by dampening the stained area with water and then holding it over the fumes of a bottle of ammonia for a few minutes. If the fabric will not water stain, moisten the stained area with a mixture of half ammonia and half water.

If the color starts to fade beyond the stain, during this process, sponge immediately with white vinegar and the fading will stop. Stains that have been allowed to set for a few days or even longer will become alkaline so reverse this process. That is, use a little vinegar on the stain first. Then if the material fades, use the ammonia solution.

Perspiration stains on a white garment usually require bleaching in the sun after the garment has been washed. If the stain does not come out with this treatment, sponge with hydrogen peroxide. Perspiration odors that cling even after washing the garment, may be removed by soaking it in a salt solution by mixing three tablespoons of salt in one quart of warm water.
