File Gasoline Tax Refund Claims

Now is the time for farmers to file for their gasoline tax refund. To receive a refund for the year ending June 30, 1957, claims must be filed on or before September 30, 1957. This reminder is offered by Everett M. Elwood, extension specialist in agricultural economics at Michigan State University.

Elwood adds that Form 2240 must be used to apply for the refund. This form will be mailed to all farmers who filed for a gas tax refund in 1956. Those who have not filed a claim before can get Form 2240 from their county agricultural agent, or from the local internal revenue office.

Farmers can make claims for a refund on all gasoline bought and used on the farm. According to Elwood, this includes gasoline used by custom operators or neighbors who helped with the planting, cultivating or harvesting of any agricultural crop. He warns that no refund will be made for gasoline used off the farm, such as for transporting family or farm goods on the public highway. Any owner, tenant or operator of a farm can file for the refund.

The highway revenue act of 1956 raised the federal tax on gasoline from 2 to 3 cents per gallon. For this reason, says Elwood, claims for gasoline bought during the past fiscal year should be figured at the rate of 3 cents per gallon.

Elwood states that the completed Form 2240 should be sent to the District Director of Internal Revenue, Federal Building, Detroit 26, Michigan. Do not send invoices, bills or statements with the form, but keep them. Revenue agents may want to check records.

To greater or lesser degree, all have subordinated the primary principle of private ownership and control of production and distribution, which is the foundation of our American economic system. In doing this have they made life better and the future brighter for their John Doe citizens? This is the question for which I shall seek an answer, from Oslo to Rome, and from Belgrade to Dublin. —G.G.

The question which should be turning over in the minds of people throughout the world is: what governmental and economic system will bring about the development of the best way of life for the John Doe citizens? In Norway and Sweden Welfare State ideas, which spring from the philosophy of Socialism, are quite well advanced in operation. The reports we will be receiving from Mr. Green in the weeks immediately ahead will be extremely interesting. Will Be Aboard Ship Sailing In Sea Fair

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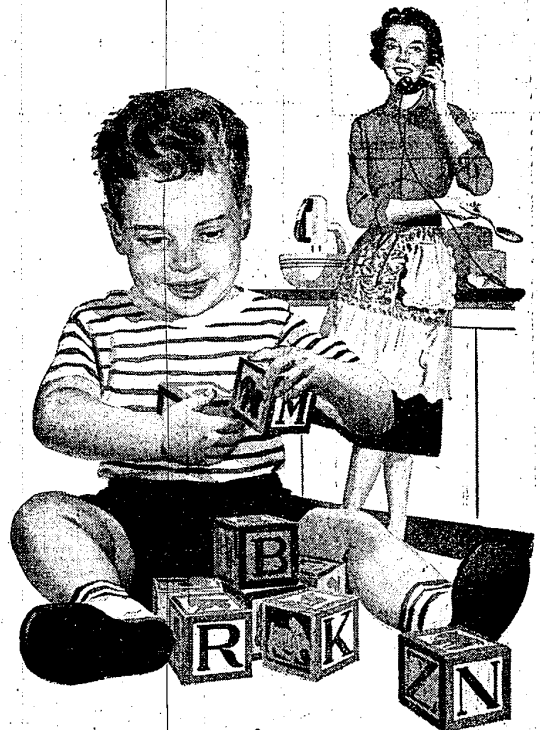
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
