**TOWNSHIP BOARD PROCEEDINGS**

The Regular Meeting of the Township Board was called to order at 8:05 p.m. by Mr. Stephenson, Chairman, on the 23rd day of July, A. D. 1957. Members present were Stephenson, Cairns, Goers, Avery, Hug, Brown and Westlake.

Minutes of the last Regular Meeting held on July 9th, 1957, read by Clerk.

Motion by Westlake, supported by Hug, that the Minutes stand approved as read. Carried.

Communications

Motion by Avery, supported by Hug, that the correspondence be received, and Clerk will reply to citizens of Wood Creek Village that we will arrange a meeting with them after the appointment of a Township Attorney. Carried, 6 yeas.

Motion by Goers, supported by Avery, that we adopt this Resolution of Intent to Rezone from R-4 to Commercial of lot on Southeast corner of Van and Middlebeigh as requested by Grace Rumford, and that it be published. Carried.

Motion by Hug, supported by

Avery, that we combine jobs of Dog Warden with Dutch Elm Disease control, and pay Mr. Raupp the equivalent of \$75.00 a week plus \$25.00 a week car allowance, on a monthly basis, retroactive to July 3, for a period of three months. Carried.

Mr. Brown commented this might not be legal, but was advised the Dog Warden is working under County Dog Warden.

Motion by Hug, supported by Avery, that this matter of resignations of Library Board members be left in abeyance. Carried.

**Ordinance Pertaining to Swimming Pools**

There are a few being built in the Township, and there are many people calling in and wanting to know what Ordinance we have pertaining to such and if it is contrary to law not to have these pools fenced. Not knowing anything about it, and knowing there was no Ordinance in existence, I thought it would be well to recommend that we provide an Ordinance for same.

Motion by Avery, supported by Brown, that we turn this matter of Ordinance covering swimming pools over to our Attorney for his recommendation. Carried.

Motion stated that Mr. Archie G. Leonard be retained as Consulting Attorney at a salary of \$125.00 a month, retroactive to July 1, 1957, for a period ending July 1st, 1958. Roll Call vote—5 yeas, 2 nays. Avery and Hug Carried.

Motion by Avery, supported by Hug, that Arthur E. Robbins be appointed as Township Attorney. Mr. Brown asked on what basis, and answered by Mr. Hug, \$300 per month, impressed with that particular Application, great deal of experience. Mr. Brown asked for what period, and it was stated on a month to month basis for remainder of fiscal year—Mr. Robbins and his firm will be at the disposal of Township at all times. In the way of a retainer, but will attend Township Meetings when asked to do so. Mr. Brown then said he had known Mr. Robbins for many years, and is very qualified. Roll Call Vote—7 yeas. Motion Carried. Mr. Robbins Township Attorney.

Motion by Hug, supported by Brown, that we adopt the recommendation and that the Township Attorney will draw up an Ordinance covering matter of charging and developers 11% of total cost of their development to pay expenses of Township Engineer. Mr. Brown called attention to the Plat Act covering this matter, and read it to the Board. I supported the Motion, but there is a possibility that someone might challenge the percentage situation and then it might be questioned in Court. If reasonable the chances are it will be upheld.

Roll Call Vote—7 yeas. Carried.

Motion by Avery, supported by Hug, that this Plat of Ridgeway Subdivision be rejected by the Township Board at this time. Roll Call Vote—5 yeas, 2 nays. Westlake and Brown. Carried.

Motion restated by Brown, supported by Avery, that a Special Meeting be called for July 30th for the sole purpose of acting on the tentative resignation of Township Treasurer, and making the appointment of the successor Treasurer to fill vacancy.

Roll Call Vote—7 yeas. Unanimously carried.

On motion made and carried, the meeting was adjourned at 10:20 p.m.
