"Brigadoon" To Run From August 6-11 At Music Circle Tent Theatre

The enchanting musical comedy "Brigadoon," one of the most popular musical shows in American stage history, will come to Music Circle, the tent theatre located on the grounds of the Rotsford Inn, Grand River at 8 Mile Road, beginning August 6 and running until August 11.

Betty McNamara and Dick Armbruster, who have already established themselves as favorites with Music Circle's audiences, will again be the featured romantic leads in this captivating fantasy of a phantom Scottish village. Also featured will be Lester Rawlins, Grace Thomas, Jeff Duncan and Vivian Joyce.

"Brigadoon" tells in story, music and dance the tale of two Americans, one romantic, the other sarcastic, who wander by chance into a Scottish Highland village called Brigadoon, a delightful phantom community that comes to life one day each century. It is the day of a fair and the day of a wedding—and the day that the village comes to life.

The romantic Yank meets a beautiful lassie with whom he falls in love and the sarcastic Yank is pursued by an impudent and amorous siren. A crisis interrupts this Scottish idyll when a pitted suitor interrupts the wedding party to declare that he will leave Brigadoon forever, an act which would cause the mystic village to disappear for all time.

The exciting chase of the suitor and its aftermath provide some of the poignantly lovely scenes of the American stage. The romantic American, seeing that this unusual day is drawing to a close, has to make up his mind whether to return to America with his friend or to stay forever in this Scottish Shangri-La with his beloved.

"The Boy Friend," the current show at Music Circle, will end its run this Sunday, August 4.

The "Stratford Shakespearean Festival" held annually in Stratford, Canada, some 125 miles from Farmington, is an event that the Farmington Players highly recommend to anyone interested in the finest of Shakespearean works.
