## Blacklock Named New Edsel Car Dealer For Area

Thomas A. Blacklock, owner of Blacklock Buick Incorporated, of Farmington, has signed an agreement to sell and service the new Edsel medium priced car line, to be introduced in September, to be introduced last week by Harley R. Riley, Detroit District sales manager of the Edsel Division of Ford Motor Company.

Blacklock-Edsel, Inc. will be established at 32411 Grand River, the present location of Blacklock Buick, Inc.

A seven-year veteran of the automobile business, Blacklock is a member of the Farmington Chamber of Commerce. He took over the Buick dealership here two years ago.

Ford Motor Company has invested \$250,000,000 to produce the new Edsel. The four-car series—Ranger, Pacer, Corsair and Citation—will be marketed initially by an organization of some 1,200 to 1,500 dealers. Eventually, there will be between 2,500 and 3,000 dealers.

Included in the 18 models are two convertibles, one in the Pacer series and the other in the Citation, plus a full line of two- and four-door sedans and hardtops, and a line of five station wagons.

Production on the new car line started Monday, July 15, at assembly plants located in Somerville, Massachusetts; Mahwah, New Jersey; Louisville, Kentucky, and San Jose, California. Two other assembly plants, one at Wayne, Michigan, and another at Los Angeles, California, will begin building Edsels at a later date.

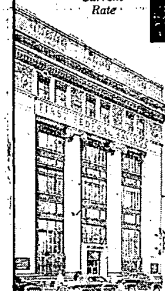

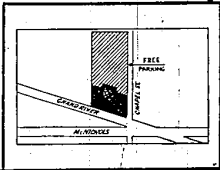
