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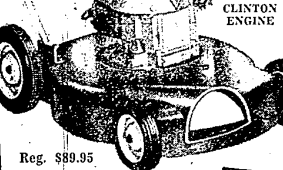
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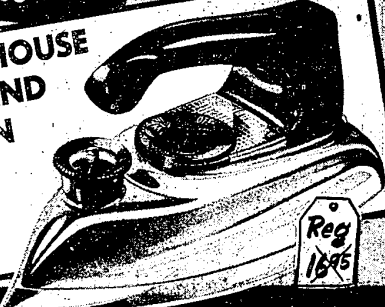

Refrain From Fertilizing Trees, Evergreens Now

Homeowners are cautioned against fertilizing their shade trees and evergreens at this time of year, by Don Juchartz, Wayne County Horticultural Agent. Fertilizer applied now will promote small twig and branch growth which will not harden up sufficiently before the winter cold. Fertilizer after the leaves fall or after October 1, he stated.

Do not neglect watering at this time. Water once every two weeks but water to a depth of a least 12 inches, allowing the soil to partially dry out between waterings to restore the oxygen in the soil.

Trend Turns Toward Pattern Floor Covering

Decoration for its own sake, a look that has been advanced in recent seasons for floor coverings, is sustained even more fully this year. The new materials and techniques have been worked, in most instances, toward creating a fresh look as well as a fresh product.

In soft surface floor coverings this look is dependent upon new fibers and new methods of production. Bouncy Acrylic and hardy Dynel promise a new range of textural selection. The natural white look, says home furnishings authorities, bring a new kind of informality to wool, and novel tufting techniques distinguish synthetic styles.

Patterns are becoming more important. Tweeds are an excellent case in point. For tweeds are no longer just cut pile or plain; they've been worked into some very definite patterns through pile level contrast, color tricks or just out-and-out design.

Modern patterns are putting fresh life into conventional axminster weaves. The Scandinavian styles, softened abstract and newly tailored motifs first introduced in floor coverings a few years ago, are now fully expressed in the majority of new axminster qualities.

There is also new concern with the more formal period patterns of the past, notes Home Furnishings Daily.

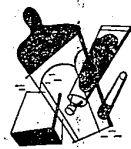

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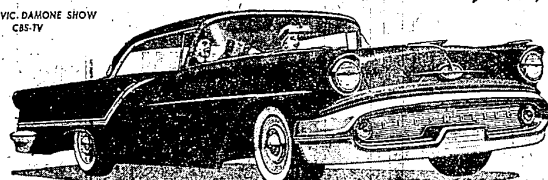
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
