Serving as assistant superintendent in charge of instruction and personnel is Marjorie Van Ameyde, Farmington resident and former principal at Southfield High. Robert L. McBride of Ypsilanti has assumed duties as principal at the Ten Mile elementary school, replacing Donald Hossler who has been advanced to the position of assistant superintendent in charge of elementary administration.

Jerry Spink, commercial teacher at the high school, had been named principal at the Farmington Junior High replacing Byron Oliver who has been re-assigned as principal at the new O. E. Dunckley Junior High. Taking over as principal of the new Kendallwood elementary school will be Doris Lachmann, fourth grade teacher at the Shawnee school last year. Picture a great national disaster in which 2,000 people and wiped out, about 60,000 are injured, and in which property loss exceeded \$20,000,000. Our whole state—even the nation—would leap to remedial action. Money and needed supplies, would pour in. The best leadership available would unite in a program of community rehabilitation.

Michigan's traffic tragedies are just equal in money, misery and death to the disaster above. Overwhelming as this may seem, the condition is not hopeless. 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Direct Dialing To Novi Area Set For Sunday

Approximately 600 Novi Telephones will be able to be dialed direct from Farmington telephones starting this Sunday, September 8, at 2:01 a.m., Farmington, Michigan Bell Telephone Company manager, John D. Kamgo, reports.

The new "Fieldbrook" dial telephones serve the area from 13 Mile to 9 1/2 Mile roads between Haggerty and Napier Roads, Kamgo said.

Dial telephones in the area have been made possible by the development of a "portable" dial telephone equipment center. The mobile unit currently in letters of the name Fieldbrook will serve the area until permanent facilities to bring dial service to the entire Northville exchange area are completed next year.

"Calls to the new Fieldbrook numbers can be dialed direct by dialing the area and letters of the name Fieldbrook plus the five numerals of the number," Kamgo said. The change will have no effect on calls to other Northville exchange telephones still served by operators.
