ought our patio was going to be a pretty good size when silding it, but now that it's finished it looks far too

That was one of our customers talking, and I know other people have had the same problem, owing to the fact that their back yard is either physically small or LOOKS small because it is helmmed in by the neighbors' property.

you are planning a patio in a small yard and want to be appearance of spaciousness, here are some points to in mind:

Keep in mind:

A repetitive design, made possible by small units such as bricks or small concrete tiles, will help make a small surface look larger, in other words, avoid an unbroken expanse of corcrete or large flagstones. A high curved fence, raised flower beds of tall shrubs can be located at the beak of lefthe patio to raise tile eye and give the illusion of nistance. Vertical boards on the fence will create a better effect than horizontal ones.

If you're building or buying a burbouch, make it a small one so lit work dominate the whole patio. Similarly, choose small but combortable) pieces of furniture.
