SMALL PATIOS CAN LOOK BIG

"I thought our patio was going to be a pretty good size when I was building it, but now that it's finished it looks far too small."

That was one of our customers talking, and I know other people have had the same problem, owing to the fact that their back yard is either physically small or LOOKS small because it is hemmed in by the neighbors' property.

If you are planning a patio in a small yard and want to give it an appearance of spaciousness, here are some points to keep in mind:

A repetitive design, made possible by small units such as bricks or small concrete tiles, will help make a small surface look larger. In other words, avoid an unbroken expanse of concrete or large flagstones. A high curved fence, raised flower beds or tall shrubs can be located at the back of the patio to raise the eye and give the illusion of distance. Vertical boards on the fence will create a better effect than horizontal ones.

If you're building or buying a barbecue, make it a small one so it won't dominate the whole patio. Similarly, choose small but comfortable pieces of furniture. If the patio beside the house, the patio fence and furniture should be painted to match the house. Otherwise, use bright colors that contrast with the house.

Avoid "breaking up" the middle of the patio with long furniture, flower beds or other objects.

Keep these principles in mind and no matter how small your patio may have to be, through necessity, you can give it that roomy, airy look that will invite the family to make it their "headquarters" all through the warm weather season.
