'Wake Up, Darling'
October 17, 18, 19**

To begin their 1957-1958 season, the Township Players of West Bloomfield have selected a sophisticated comedy entitled "Wake Up, Darling", by Alex Gottlieb.

Produced at the Barrymore Theater, New York, in May, 1956, the play has only recently been released for community theater production.

A farcical matrimonial tangle is the subject of the story. Polly Emerson, after several years' struggle in small parts in the theater, has obtained the starring role in a new musical comedy, partly because the young playwright is smitten with her. Polly has neglected to tell the playwright that she is married, and he visits her apartment with dishonorable intentions, mixed with the qualms of an unusually shy personality.

Polly's husband, Don, arrives to find the playwright planning a big evening with his wife, and without revealing the marriage, implies that he is on a similar errand which is only one of many past such experiences. Don is a frustrated playwright himself, though he makes a good living writing perfume ads.

Resenting Polly's success and the playwright's ability, he sets out to foil the aims of both, but without unexpected complications which make for a hysterically funny evening.

Adding to the complications are Don's part-time secretary who divides her time between Mahoney's Bar and the pursuit of unwary males; an independent maid who runs the household; a glamorous woman descendant of the Emersons for a visit, two bewildered policemen and the young playwright's father who, a gay old boy himself, is saddened by his son's lack of amatory seasoning.

"Wake Up, Darling" begins the second full season of full-length plays presented by the fast-growing West Bloomfield group. Previous productions included "Light Up the Sky", "High Ground" and "Like It Here". The play will be produced October 17, 18 and 19 in the Auditorium of West Bloomfield High School, Orchard Lake and Commerce Roads. It is now in rehearsal and set construction is also proceeding.

**Urge Parents
To Alert Child
On Dangers**

Parents were urged by the state health department to alert their children to the dangers of accidents now that school is starting again.

Dr. Goldie Corneliuson, director of maternal and child health for the department, pointed out that accidents were the No. 1 killer among school age children last year, taking 524 lives.

Young children should be shown the safest way to and from school, and children of all ages should be instructed on how to avoid traffic and playground dangers, Dr. Corneliuson said.

It is not too late to arrange a complete physical examination in a pediatrician's or the family physician's office for children who are entering school for the first time. Attention should be given to the child's vision, hearing, posture, muscle tone, skin, feet, weight and teeth, and any defects found should be corrected immediately. The examination ideally should be repeated once a year and as a minimum should be given again when the child enters the seventh grade.

Parents also should check on their children's immunization status to make sure their shots and boosters for smallpox, diphtheria, whooping cough, tetanus and polio are up to date, Dr. Corneliuson said.

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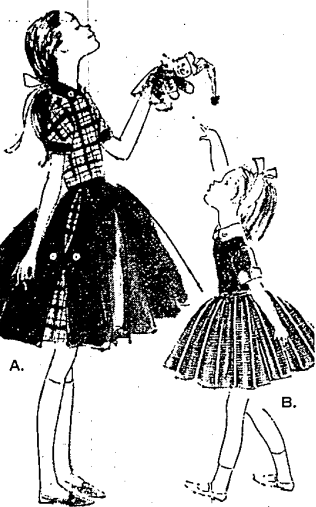
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
