PLEASE TAKE NOTICE that a Special Election of the qualified electors of the aforesaid school district will be held in the Clarenceville High School located at 20210 Middlebelt Road in said school district on Monday, September 16, 1957, and at such Special Election the following propositions will be submitted to the qualified electors of the school district.

PROPOSITION I. DISPOSITION OF PROPERTY

"Shall Clarenceville School District of Oakland and Wayne Counties, State of Michigan, sell, or exchange for other lands needed by said School District, or otherwise dispose of, for value, lands not needed for school purposes and described as: That part of the Southeast 1/4 of Section 1, Town 1 South, Range 9 East, Wayne (City of Livonia) County, Michigan, commencing from the center 1/4 corner of Section 1, and continuing thence South 1 degree 38 minutes 51 seconds East along the North and South 1/4 line of said Section 101.03 feet to the point of beginning; thence North 88 degrees 28 minutes 35 seconds East, 300.0 feet; thence South 1 degree 38 minutes 51 seconds East 63.35 feet; thence South 88 degrees 27 minutes 50 seconds West 300.0 feet; to the North and South 1/4 section line; thence North 1 degree 38 minutes 35 seconds West 61.97 feet to the point of beginning, being 0.43 acres, more or less?"

PROPOSITION II. TRANSFER OF FUNDS

"Shall Clarenceville School District of Oakland and Wayne Counties, State of Michigan, transfer the sum of fifteen thousand dollars (\$15,000.00) from its 1956 Building, Site, and Equipment Fund to its 1952 Building, Site, and Equipment Fund?"

The polls of election will be open from 7:00 o'clock A.M. to 6:00 o'clock P.M. Eastern Standard Time.

Only registered voters are eligible to vote.

Each voter voting on the propositions on Disposition of Property and Transfer of Funds must be a citizen of the United States, above age of twenty-one (21) years, have resided in the State of Michigan six (6) months and in the school district thirty (30) days next preceding the day of election.

Fall Term Class Schedule

A free Self-Improvement Clinic, Young Women's Christian Association announced its Fall term of classes which will begin the week of September 23 this week.

A full program of activities is offered for girls and women with men included in some classes. Y.W.C.A. officials said. Registrations are now being taken at the branch building at 17289 Redford Avenue.

The schedule of classes is as follows: Bowling, Tuesday afternoon; bridge, a beginning class on Monday evening; an advanced class on Tuesday evening and a mixed class Friday afternoon; ceramics, Tuesday morning; drawing and sketching, Thursday morning; flower arranging, Wednesday morning; knitting, Tuesday afternoon; millinery, Thursday morning; and oil painting, Monday morning and afternoon and Thursday afternoon and evening.

Classes in sewing will be given Wednesday afternoon and evening and a class in speaking before groups, an informal course in public speaking, on Tuesday evenings. A class in swimming for mothers and daughters will be offered on Saturday morning.

The class will be open to girls 25 years of age through girls who have not yet reached 51 inches tall who are accompanied by their mothers. This course will be held at Cody High. A trimmastics course for relaxation, body build-up and poise will be offered on Tuesday afternoon.

A nursery for pre-school age children, 2½ through 5 years of age, will be maintained on Tuesday. There will be both morning and afternoon classes and children will be accepted whether or not

their mothers enroll in any classes. The YWBA Sifting Clinic will begin Tuesday, September 24, at 3:45 p.m. with classes to be continued for seven weeks. The class is open to both boys and girls 12 years of age or older.

A complete Saturday Recreation Program will be offered at Cody High School. This is a ten week session and will begin Saturday, September 28. Included in the program will be ten swimming classes from beginners through advanced and synchronized swimming. The swimming classes will be open to girls and women only. Other classes which will include both boys and girls are: creative dancing, fencing, dramatics, puppetry, crafts, recreational games, and drawing and painting.
