Man Arraigned After Car Crash

FARMINGTON
A recent fatal accident in Farmington which killed a Union Lake woman has led

to the arraignment of Richard Johnson of Lansing on charges of involuntary manslaughter.

Johnson was confined to Oakland County jail after standing mute before Judge Michael Hand. Bond was set at \$5,000. A preliminary examination has been set for July 27.

The accident occurred last week at 14 Mile and Halstead. The car driven by Johnson reportedly plowed head-on into a car driven by Mrs. Doris Smart, 26, of Union Lake. She was killed and her son, Nicholas Smart, 2, was confined to the intensive care ward of Pontiac General Hospital.

As of Thursday, a hospital spokesman reported the boy's condition as improved, but he is still confined to intensive care.

Another son, David, 4, who was confined to Jackson Hospital, is reported in good condition and has been transferred to the pediatric ward.
