

Senate Rivals Criticizing Hart

Incumbent U.S. Senator Philip A. Hart was the target of campaigns by two Republican challengers seeking the Senate nomination in the Sept. 1 primary.

Livonia's James F. O'Neil, and Charlotte's Ely Peterson, O'Neil attacked Hart's record which he termed "the major issue in this year's U.S.

Senate race," while Mrs. Peterson—who politely endorsed GOP Presidential nominee Barry Goldwater—said Senator Hart "has done nothing except promote the policies of the Administration."

O'Neil, the only GOP member of the State Board of Education, describing Hart's record, characterized it thus:

"Hart's record of having voted for all the extravagant spending proposals put forth by the present administration which threaten to bankrupt our economy."

"Hart's record of fanning the fire of inflation which threatens the loss of jobs and industries to foreign countries."

"Hart's record of being unable to manage his own financial affairs and establishing a special fund to cover his extensive expenses and pushing for a 33 per cent pay raise for himself."

"Hart's record of voting the way a special-interest group wanted him to on every issue they were interested in during the 8th Congress."

Hart's record of headline seeking, by conducting numerous investigations and studies without positive results as far as bringing jobs and industries to Michigan.

Meanwhile, Mrs. Peterson told an area audience that she backed both Goldwater and vice-presidential candidate William Miller, but with reservations.

Said Mrs. Peterson: "I am in favor of honoring our commitments to preserve the independence of South Vietnam. At the same time I am opposed to initiating a full-scale land war in which thousands of Americans will perish."

CIVIL RIGHTS—"I support the civil rights laws of the State of Michigan, which ban discrimination in public accommodations and employment. . . . I support the Dirksen substitute amendment, which ultimately became the Civil Rights Act of 1964, as a reasonable way of coping with the discrimination problem in certain key areas."

EDUCATION—"The best thing the federal government could do for education would be to ease our crushing tax burdens, thus freeing new resources for local improvement of the public schools. I favor a carefully-designed program of federal aid to teacher training and to our nation's colleges."

FOREIGN AID—"I am basically in favor of technical assistance programs and programs of military assistance to free nations threatened by subversion of aggression. I am quite skeptical of foreign economic aid in practice, although I am not absolutely opposed to it in principle."

ARMS CONTROL AND DISARMAMENT—"I favor conscientious, sound efforts to increase military stability, to reduce the dangers of surprise attack and to slow down and halt the dangerous arms race."

SPACE—"I am extremely skeptical of 'crash' programs to put a man on the moon. I favor sound methodical space programs, but I feel that too little consideration has been given to the American taxpayer who must foot the bill."
