Sidney Strongs Celebrate 55 Years Of Marriage

Mr. and Mrs. Sidney Strong celebrated their 55th wedding anniversary with their five children, eighteen grandchildren and two great-grandchildren on August 19 in their home at 1251 William in Plymouth.


Strong, who is chairman of the Plymouth City Plan Commission, married Alice Vincent in Colchester, Michigan more than a half century ago. He came to Plymouth in 1920 as City Manager after having served as Assistant City Manager in Sault Ste. Marie. Prior to that he had spent 12 years as a U.S. engineer on the Saint Marys River locks in the Upper Peninsula border city.

Now retired, except for his activities as a Plymouth historian and chairman of the Planning Commission, Strong served as City Manager from 1920 to 1927. He celebrated his 80th birthday last Feb. 23. Long in-

terested in the history of western Wayne County and adjacent areas, Strong has a sizeable collection of photographs of Plymouth and other communities dating back to the late 80's. Part of his collection was on exhibit in the Community Resources Workshop Open House recently held in the Franklin High School.

Jean Crain has the other Red Cross car for this large area.

Mickey received a call during the last hot spell, real late at night, to make an run to Metropolitan Airport and take a package posthaste to Providence Hospital.

She followed orders to the letter as she has been trained to do—but what person wouldn't have a somewhat eerie feeling for what she was carrying was an eye—just blink from someone who had passed away—to someone lying in a hospital waiting—for Mickey.

There are other responsibilities in Red Cross Motor Corp besides the routine of taking workers to Chapter House— Now Mickey says there is more and more open-heart surgery with whole blood being rushed from donor to patient—and the day may be hot, humid, and uncomfortable but the mission makes you feel like a vital link aiding suffering humanity.

Never was this perhaps more true than the quick response of Mickey and her fellow workers rushing food and Red Cross aid to the stricken people of Anchor Bay after the spring tornado. Juanita Pural and Wesley Walker assist as spell-off drivers for this area too.

While some of us around were having our hair done Saturday—or shopping in the cool super-mart—there was another group using scrapers, steamers, and other miscellaneous tools to peel off wallpaper that had been on a very long time, off of very old walls. Under the direction of Helen Hunter members of the Northwest Child Guidance Clinic Band were readying their new building on Merriman for occupancy. After the wall paper is removed all those not busy please show up with rollers—time and color to be announced.

Another group that never stands still is the Ways and Means of the Redford Suburban League. All summer Evelyn Kramer Enid Dobbert and Jeanne Sansone have been—meeting, writing, rewriting, getting acquainted with artists, actors, musicians and such that it takes to put their project on the road for Fall. 
