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# First Loop Win Bolsters Clarencville

Happy Ralph Temby was doing the talking.

He's the coach of Clarencville high school's football team which Friday night scored a 13-7 triumph at Brighton in the Wayne-Oakland League opener.

It's to be remembered that it was against Brighton in the final game of the 1963 season that Clarencville snapped a streak of defeats which had stretched over two years.

Thus, Clarencville stands 2-0 in its last two league out-ings.

"Maybe you should keep on playing Brighton," a wise-crack- ing fan remarked to Temby.

"No, because we honestly think we can take some of the other teams in this league, too," fired back the coach.

Then the coach continued: "It makes a difference if you can get off on the right foot, especially around here because of our troubles winning the last few years."

"The kids on the team... and the kids in school... are full of enthusiasm. I don't think we'll be beat last again in the league."

Temby wouldn't single out one player for his play against Brighton.

The reason was simple: "This was truly a team job."

Herb Bader's conversion made it 13-0 for Clarencville.

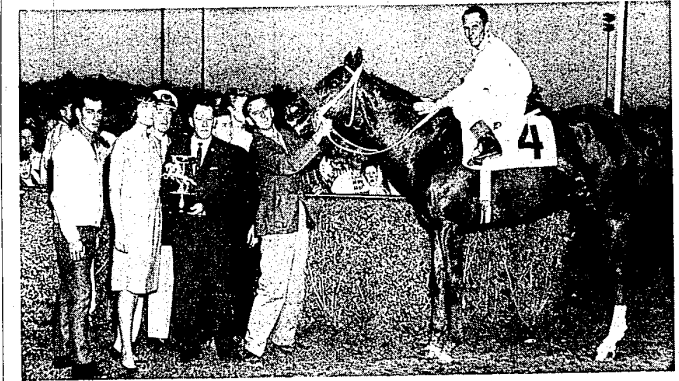

# Honor Great Horse at DRC Saturday

One of the outstanding horses ever to compete in Michigan and now a key attraction in the state's growing thoroughbred breeding industry will be honored by the handicap which highlights Winner's Circle Week at the Detroit Race Course.

The famed Calumet Farm's Beau Prince, winner of the 1962 Michigan Mile, now stands at the Kay-Dee Farm of T. F. Doney at Dearborn, where he completed his first season in stud.

The Beau Prince Handicap, a one mile feature with a purse of \$7,500, will be contested Saturday at the DRC.

Dorsey, one of the leaders of the Michigan's Thoroughbred Breeders' Association, will make the presentation in the winner's circle.

Jimmy Jones, long a top figure in training circles, brought Beau Prince to the DRC for The Mile in 1962 and with Steve Brooks in the saddle, Beau Prince whipped a field of 11 rivals.

In this victory marked the first time in the history of the Mile a favorite had won the classic. Jones recently resigned his position with Calumet to be head men of the nation's two outstanding apprentice

riders, Glynn Bernis, the 17-year-old Louisianan who has been campaigning throughout the DRC meeting, and Senon Trevino, a 22-year-old Texan who is riding on the Chicago Circuit.

Bernis ranks third in the national jockeys' race behind Bobby Ussery and Walter Blum, while Trevino is in sixth place.

Under a revised program, the DRC will have eight races daily Monday-through Friday with the usual 10 events on Saturday. The daily post remains at 2:30 p.m. and the Saturday post at 2 p.m.

This was the scoring story of the game:

1—Only one minute and a half had expired when Farmington led, 7-0. A had pass from center was fumbled by Riverside's punter. The ball sailed into the end zone where Jim Jaffe fell on it for North Farmington. Tom Trausch converted.

2—Riverside retaliated with a pair of second-quarter touchdowns. Dave Dyer and Don Yasenach plunged across from one and two yards out, respectively.

3—After North Farmington had fluffed two great chances, it finally cashed the winning touchdown with 1:34 left to play. Bob Linderber capped a 44-yard march by going across on a slant from the three. A Bill Oltershaw to John McDonald pass on fourth down picked up 11 yards and was the key play in the drive.

"You could just see our gang let down after they looked up and saw that they had scored so quickly," said Holland afterward.

Throughout the rest of the first period and the second, North Farmington did little.

So at halftime, Holland went for a little psychology in the dressing room. He brought in his dad, Lee, from Iowa.

"My dad has come a long way to see us win this one," decreed the coach.

Things changed for North Farmington in the second half.

Once in the third period, North Farmington marched down to the Riverside one before being stopped.

Early in the fourth period,

North Farmington reached the 13 of Riverside.

On the final drive a couple of passes from Oltershaw to McDonald helped to sustain the march.

The defense was outstanding in the second half for North Farmington, keeping the Riverside team, which was bigger and hitting harder, well in check.

Craig Carpenter was brilliant both as a runner and a defensive back. Skip Moore and Jerry Pound also helped to make the defense tick.

In the statistical breakdown, Riverside had a wide edge—150-91 yards on the ground, 54-32 in passing.

"Most of their yardage came in the first half, especially in the second period," added Coach Holland.

This Friday afternoon, North Farmington entertains Detroit Northern. The Farmington boys will be shooting for their third straight victory without a loss.
