Township Board Approves Sewers

Sewer installation was approved for Meadowbrook Hills No. 1, Meadowbrook Hills No. 2, with an estimated cost of \$203,700 (\$120 per unit), at Farmington's Township Board meeting Monday night.

Set up for public hearings Oct. 28 were Fairgreen Hills, Golf Lake Hills, and Coventry subdivisions with sewer installation estimated at \$103,000.

Kemberton Park will also have a hearing Nov. 16 to determine sewer necessity.

In other Board action:
• The Board unanimously approved the purchase of 60 "Speed Electrically Timed" signs for \$300.
• The Elks' annual Turkey Shoot at Grand River near Halsted Road was approved for Nov. 8.

Two Stakes Head DRC Race Menu

The first two of six stake events to be run during the final portion of the Detroit Race Menu's meeting will be decided Saturday.

Highlighting the big weekend racing program will be the \$100,000 Wolverine Handicap for three-year-olds and up and the \$100,000 Championship, for two-year-olds.

The Wolverine will be contested at one mile and an eighth and The Championship at one mile and a sixteenth.

Prime interest centers in The Championship since this marks the beginning of races which young stars are asked to go a distance. Most two-year-old events until this time have been raced at a mile or shorter distances.

With The Championship owners, trainers and fans will get a quick indication of stars who may go on to figure prominently in the future.

The Championship is expected to attract the finest juveniles now campaigning at the DRC. The field likely will be headed by Mrs. Anne Nichols' fine Michigan bred Belle's Pocket.

The thorough filly by Pocket Ruler out of Emerald Belle won a division of the Michigan Futurity last month. In that event she withstood a bitter stretch duel with M. H. Van Berg's Nice To Know.

One of Belle's Pocket's top challengers will be Rae-Lynn, owned and trained by Van (Heavy) Horton. Rae-Lynn captured an allowance event two-weeks ago in impressive fashion.

In that race she turned back Fisherman Tale, from the Van Berg string, Jimmy Pitt's Cabin Kid and Bell Mett, from the stable of M. V. Cobb.

That trio is expected to be in the field again.

Mrs. Grace Kosiba, prominent Michigan owner, probably will be represented by Bright Gleam.

Captain Brother, from the stable of prominent Boston sportsman Peter Fuller, is another possibility.

Fuller likewise is expected to provide a challenge to the Wolverine with Lucky Uncle.

Lucky Uncle won The Consolation at the DRC on Michigan Mile Day in a closing which was faster for the mile and one-sixteenth than that recorded by Tibaldo and Going Ahead as they finished in a dead heat for the victory in the classic.

Fuller is well known in Michigan sporting circles not only for the string of horses he campaigns at the DRC, but also as the leading manager of former Michigan State football star, Tom McNeely. Fuller guided McNeely into a world's heavyweight championship against Floyd Patterson, when he held the title.

The Van Berg combination of father and son will be represented in The Wolverine also. Their color bearer will be Oak Ruler.

Other probable starters include Top Lease, Devil Patrol, Sing Along, Red Eff, Peter Pumpkin and Ramblin' Road.

There are eight races on the Monday-through-Friday cards at the DRC with post time 3:30 p.m. On Saturdays, there are 10 races, with the first post at 2 p.m.

Ski Patrol Asks New Volunteers

Volunteers for the National Ski Patrol's local contingents are being recruited in the Livonia-Plymouth-Redford-Farmington area and a series of first-aid classes are scheduled for training.

Announcement of the program came this week from Douglas Oak, 17330 Mayfield, Livonia, public relations chairman for the aid rescue program.

Skiers can become Patrol members and earn the rescue group's rust-colored parka by taking a Red Cross first aid course. Volunteers then man training areas to provide emergency aid to injured skiers.

A morning class will begin October 21 in Livonia at the Red Cross chapter house, running for 29 hours in Saturday sessions. Later in the month an evening series of courses will be scheduled.
