## CURTAIN GOING UP

Last week old Wally finally found some free time to drive down to the Wolverine Hotel and see what the players at the Maquet Theatre were up to. The play being performed is "Seven Year Itch". I had always thought this show was a farce comedy. The pace is usually fast and the situations are comic in complexion.

Not so with the Ray Wright production of "Itch". The show seemed to be playing at 33 and 1/2 when 78 p.m. was absolute necessary to keep this play from falling into the heavy pattern of a drama. Too often the players were static when they should have been more frantic in their movements. Mr. Wright had better take a closer look at the demands of comedy as against drama. There is a big difference.

Too often the work on the production: the lights, set, and costumes have an elegance and polish to them. But the direction missed the target.

### Proposes Bureau for Quick Trials

"I propose in order to alleviate the crowded docket in the Circuit Court, and make possible faster trial of civil cases, a bureau of assistance be established and administered by the County Clerks of office for existing personnel now handling the filing of documents. This bureau would supervise all of the details in the filing of a civil case, and police the formal allegations of the parties until a single point at issue is produced by the plaintiff and defendant. Once the issue or issues in the case are formulated, then the judge himself would take over.

This bureau would function in the same relation to Circuit Court as the Friend of the Defendant does in Domestic Relation Cases, and as the Probate Analyst Department does for Probate Court."

This is the message to the people of Wayne from Joseph Leonard Craig, prominent Detroit Attorney and candidate for Circuit Judge at the election Tuesday, November 3rd, Ballot #509.

Any additional cost to the taxpayers," continues Mr. Craig, "would be avoided by using some of the employees now filing documents for the County Clerks office, to staff the new bureau."

Attorney Craig further suggests that, wherever possible, the forms used in both divorce cases and other types of civil cases should be standardized and printed with areas left blank for the insertion of a claim or demand that is extraordinary. He also believes that opinions rendered by any Court in any case should be filed in a Court Library for the use of Judges and lawyers only.
