## Education Candidates Will Speak

Under the new Michigan Constitution the State Board of Education will become a very important force in public education in Michigan. Eight members will be elected on Nov. 3.

So that voters can become familiar with the candidates, the Oakland County Superintendents Association is sponsoring two public meetings for the purpose of giving interested citizens in Oakland County an opportunity to meet the candidates and learn something about them and their views.

Both sessions will be held at Pontiac Northern High School at 8 p.m. Wednesday, Oct. 14 (tonight) the Democratic Candidates will be introduced. Tuesday, Oct. 27, will be the night for the Republicans.

## Bain Says Ease Taxes

John I. Bain, a candidate for the Democratic nomination for State Representative from the 64th District, promised in a statement last week that he would work to ease the tax burden on local property owners if he is elected.

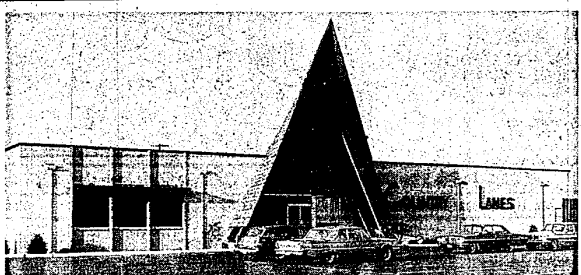
Bain is running for the Democratic nomination in the September 1 primary in the district which includes the cities of Farmington, Keego Harbor, Lathrup Village and Southfield, west of Lathrup and north of Twelve Mile, and the townships of Farmington and West Bloomfield.

Stating that the reason communities in this area have had to raise local property taxes for schools and other services is that the state has not been meeting its responsibilities, Bain pointed out that the state's share of school financing has dropped from fifty-nine percent to forty-one percent in recent years.

He said that to make up for this loss of revenue local property taxes have been increased to provide fifty-five percent of the budget as against the thirty-six percent of a few years ago.

Bain also said that, if elected, he would pay major attention to traffic safety and would offer legislation to correct traffic hazards around school zones.
