

'M' Rally Beats State; Lions Triumph

COLLEGE FOOTBALL
For the first time in a decade, Michigan beat Michigan State. The Wolverines had to push across two touchdowns on a pair of passes in the final quarter to down the Spartans by a 17-10 lead after State had capitalized on a Michigan fumble to take an early lead.

A record MSU crowd of 78,234 watched the proceedings which had all the earmarks of a major upset until Michigan got moving in the final six minutes of action.

Michigan now is 3-0 for the season and 1-0 in the Big Ten Race. State has a 1-2 record.

With Ohio State rocking defending champion Illinois, 27-0, all signs now point to Michigan and Ohio State fighting it out for the crown and the

coveted trip to the Rose Bowl. Notre Dame's revived Irish also keep winning. They took care of the Air Force in easy style last Saturday. Texas routed the final quarter to down the Spartans by a 17-10 lead after State had capitalized on a Michigan fumble to take an early lead.

University of Detroit was no match for Villanova, which made it four straight by drubbing the Titans, 34-0. Wayne State played Western Reserve to a scoreless standoff.

Four Stakes Wind UP DRC Card

Four stakes will be crowded into the final week as the Detroit Race Course heads into the closing stages of the greatest racing in the state.

The 72-day DRC meeting closes on October 22.

The four stakes to be contested all are for three-year-olds and upward. They are:

Saturday, Oct. 17—The \$25,000 Hat Trick Handicap at a mile and one-quarter.

Thursday, Oct. 22—The \$20,000 DRC Handicap at a mile and one-eighth.

Thursday, Oct. 22—The \$7,500 Distance Championship at two miles.

Thursday, Oct. 22—The Quick Step at one-half mile with a purse of \$5,000.

"This is one of the richest and strongest programs ever to be offered at the close of a Michigan racing season," Racing Secretary Ray Hopson says. "With three of the races at distances they hold exceptional interest for the fans."

Hopson is hopeful A. J. Abbott's fine handicapper, Starbaron, will top the field in the Hat Trick Handicap.

Starbaron competed in the \$65,500 added Michigan Mile and then was second to City Line in the \$25,000 Sweepstakes.

The consistent City Line, owned by Detroit's T. A. Grisham and trained by Johnny Meaux, is expected to go in the DRC Handicap on closing day. City Line won the Michi-

gan Mile and the Sweepstakes then was shipped to Keeneland, where he was second to Swoosie in the Lafayette Handicap.

Stars that will compete in the Distance Championship will be drawn from ones which have completed in the Olympic Series.

These include Frankie Laloe, Scrivener and Beaudine.

In addition to the excellent stakes program there will be other features during the closing week.

On Wednesday, October 21, there will be a drawing for the \$1,000 Wonderland Center "Shopping Spree" which the DRC is sponsoring in connection with Wonderland's fifth birthday celebration.
