

Farnum Urges Continued Benefits for Veterans

(Editor's Note: From now until the final election in November, The Observer will welcome statements on issues by rival candidates for various public offices. We'll edit them as to length and will at-

tempt to give the same amount of space, each week, in the same story, to opponents.

Billie S. Farnum, Democratic candidate for U.S. Congress from the new 19th Congressional

District, said he would push for continued special assistance for veterans in a statement this week.

The only one of the two candidates for the post to issue a position paper this week, Farnum released this statement:

"It is one thing to talk of the nation's debt to war veterans, and quite another to actually do something about it." Billie S. Farnum, candidate for Congress, told a gathering in his honor in Keego Harbor. "The Democrats have talked little, permitting their record to speak for itself."

Farnum, now "watchdog of the tax dollar" as Michigan's Auditor-General, is the Democratic nominee in the new 19th Congressional District. It covers Pontiac, western Oakland County and ... in Wayne County ... Northville and Redford Township.

"What has already been done by the Kennedy-Johnson Administration is worthy of Democratic pride," Farnum continued. "In Congress I will join in the effort to make that policy in this area even a more worthy expression of the admiration of a grateful nation."

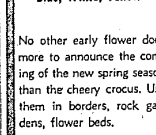

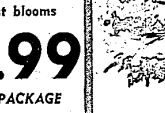
