Gluckstein's Blast Angers Incumbents

Martin E. Gluckstein, a Democratic candidate for Farmington Township Trustee, has issued the following statement on the issues facing Township voters in this November's election:

"The people who have invested their lives—and their family's lives—in Farmington Township deserve to have their investment protected and respected. This demands the election of local officials with initiative, integrity, and independence."

"I have been attending Township Board meetings for

over five years and have seen our Township slowly led down the road that ends in a suburban wasteland. Our zoning Ordinance is being subjected contemptuously, by some of the very same officials elected to uphold it. Interested citizens are divided and abused. Urgent needs affecting the safety and welfare of our children are ignored, or merely given lip service. The public's right to know the state of the Township's finances is hidden behind misleading budgets and legal loopholes," Gluckstein went on to say.

He then charged his opponents with conducting their campaign, as they conduct the public's business, "irresponsibly."

"Along with my Democratic running mates, I am dedicated to the principle of open government, in which citizen participation is actively encouraged. If elected I would welcome citizen 'watchdog' committees at Township Board meetings," he said.

"My opponents, a coalition of interest speculator and a politically appointed yes-man, apparently accept the doctrine that 'not everything that comes before the Township Board is public business,' a view of government that inevitably leads to corruption. This public-bested attitude was expressed by one of their own appointees, the Township Attorney, at a meeting of the Board. And neither of my Republican opponents objected to this flagrant violation of the public's right-to-know."
