





chael Hirtmann and Giselud Steinhauer of Germany, and Lars Engell of Sweden—made brief addresses, expressing their gratitude for this country's hospitality.

The emphasis, in all the speeches was on peace and international understanding.

Thomas Sendens of the Kiwanis Club praised the U.N.'s role in keeping the peace.

Ed Oglesby, representing the Exchange Club, recalled his own delightful experience as host to an exchange student. The Exchange Clubs, he said, have the same purpose as the United Nations—"a peaceful world."

The keynote speaker, Legionnaire James Casey, has the lean, youthful appearance, and the commanding microphone style of an officer on the M-1 Rifle range.

When he began talking off Communism's virtues around the world, it seemed obvious that a conventional right-wing speech was under way.

But at the same time, let us remember, bright new nations have been brought into the world by the UN.

"We should realize that the United Nations is not a framework for stability; but rather a framework for change within the Democratic process."

This listener's thoughts went back to 1952, when presidential candidate Adlai Stevenson made similar statements in a speech before the American Legion. It was expected that they would give him a chilly response. But, instead, they interrupted him 25 times—with loud cheering.

Adlai Stevenson would have enjoyed James Casey's speech. And he would have enjoyed the way the United Nations Day was celebrated in Farmington.

Much of the credit for the success of the ceremonies must be given to Commander George Griffin and his men of the George Walker Post. Obviously, the image of the American Legion as a citadel of ultra-conservatism is a distorted and unfair one.

Good Handyman Can Design Own Interiors

Four bright new colors in the line of four-foot wide hardboard panels make it easy for the handyman to design modern bathroom interiors.

The colors—Sunlight Yellow, Woodland Green, Hawaiian Coral, and Twilight Blue—also can be used as accent panels.

Plastic-finished hardboard is widely-used for bathroom remodeling because of its resistance to heat and moisture.

The panels can be installed right over old walls. The baked melamine plastic finish, which resembles that on a refrigerator, can be damp-wiped clean.

Local lumber dealers carry hardboard paneling, which is secured with wallboard adhesive.

Matching moldings are available, too, for use with these new colors. There now are 11 colors, including Swan White, available in this line of plastic-finished hardboard.

School Board OK's Resolutions

Board members felt the resolution was unclear and interfered with the transportation of parochial students and the supplying of a nurse to parochial schools, both activities in which they are presently engaged.

Michigan Association of School Boards resolutions passed were:

- The association will work for legislation and administrative rules which will assure that money now used for interest payments may be used for educational purposes. Herbert Neal offered the only opposition to this resolution which has to do with the borrowing of money against anticipated state aid as well as other money on anticipated taxes.
- The Michigan Association of School Boards endorses procedures which would recognize the advantage of newly elected school board members assuming the responsibilities of office at an early date after their election. (Present law provides that in some districts there is considerable time between election and the taking of office. Detroit is an example.)
- The Michigan Association of School Boards shall study the problems involving the calling of special elections in school districts and work for the enactment of such legislation as the Association deems necessary and desirable to facilitate the calling of such elections.
- Cooperative efforts shall be encouraged to benefit greater numbers of children through the intermediate school districts of our state.
- The Association opposes setting up another agency in addition to the one already existing to represent "public" interest. Boards of education have the legal authority to represent the public. (This proposal refers to binding decisions imposed by mediators.)
- Support was offered to a change in the Tenure Act which calls for a unanimous vote of the board of education for refusal of tenure.
- The Michigan Association of School Boards shall use its influence with local assessing officers and with the state legislature in attempting to develop a code of uniformity in the assessing of real property for tax purposes.
- Legislation for financing public schools shall be enacted which assures that public funds shall be allocated to schools, which allocation is determined through uniform assessing practices, considers the available wealth of the district, considers

Recalls Rex As Youngster

Mrs. Valerie Sprader visited the Observer's Farmington office, on Saturday, Oct. 24, to say that she enjoyed "immensely" our account of her brother, Rex Casey's career. She took four extra copies of the paper with her, when she left.

own recommendations in these areas as follows:

SAFETY—Support of legislation to lower speed limits in school zones. Full stop and go lights at corners now served by blinker lights. Township board consideration at each meeting of the safety advisory. Creation of a citizens advisory committee on safety.

ZONING—Preservation of presently zoned single residential areas, especially where other single homes have already been built on nearby land. Review of present practices of the zoning board with an eye toward giving citizens a fairer chance to present their views at hearings.

WATER AND SEWERS—Performance not promises in bringing water and sewers to all areas of the township that need and want them. A real effort in speeding up water and sewer projects.

HEALTH—Immediate action is needed to remove the hazardous health conditions that exist in those areas of the township where septic tanks are no longer adequate to handle sewage.

RECREATION—We need a joint township-school board approach to working out a recreation program that uses existing school facilities.
