## Elly Scores Knockout Talks with Farmingtonites

There are several things I hope I never come face to face with in open combat, a bear after hibernation, a Wavac warrior on the war path and Elly Peterson, when she has the courage of her moral convictions. This lady is a real scrapper and Saturday, in 10 minutes time she had torn more holes in the Johnson administration than a barrage of machine gunners through a sheet of cellophane.

Elly Peterson arrived in Farmington on Saturday, about four o'clock by bus. She had already put in a full day of campaigning and speech-making. Starting off on the east side of Detroit she arrived at Farmers Market about 6:40 in the morning and spoke to a crowd of about 500 people. Proceeding from there she went house to house in the 14th Congressional district, calling on people in their homes. Royal Oak, Clawson and Berkley were next on the schedule and then she proceeded to Farmington. She appeared fresh and unweary, however, and elected to go about and talk to people gathered in the Center rather than make a speech.

She went from the Center directly to Republican Headquarters where a crowd had gathered to honor her with a reception. Elly Peterson is a warm, friendly person who is at her best talking to people. She is a good listener, and no matter how many people are with her, she gives her total attention to the person she is talking to, a most flattering trait.

Saturday, her striking coloring, white skin and enormous supple eyes, were set off with a black and white flecked knit suit and her silver hair, which gives her a distinguished appearance, was worn simply.

Utterly feminine in appearance and manner, once she steps up in front of people and begins to talk about politics, she is a different person, head thrown back, eyes ablaze, she is a merciless opponent and rains as many telling blows upon her hapless opponent as Joe Louis in his hey-day.

She criticized Phil Hart, her opponent bitterly for his actions in defeating a bill which would have allowed college students to deduct college expenses from their income tax. She also stated that he had been utterly ruthless in his attitude toward the Sleeping Bear Dunes proposed state park. "The people were all prepared for this party," she said, "it would have been of enormous benefit to them. The locale was perfect and the tourist business would have profited them tremendously."

Instead Senator Hart introduced his S-1253 bill which proposed a Federal Park of over 71,000 acres which would have wrecked their homes and created havoc with their school system. "The people were very resentful," stated Mrs. Peterson, "because Senator Hart had done all this without even paying a visit to their area."

She then laughingly admitted that her husband, Colonel W. Merritt Peterson, had accused her of spending more time thinking about Phil Hart than she did about him. "I'll be glad when the election is over, Elly," she quoted him as saying, "Then I can replace Phil Hart in your thoughts."

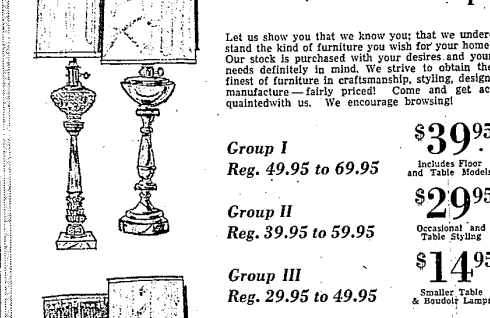
She then went on to the Johnson Administration. "Our foreign policy is most important. These two young men who are replacing Khrushchev are not the refined, intelligent men Johnson would have you believe they are. They are hard, young, machine-like without sentiment or compassion."

She concluded her statement with a knockout blow at the present administration. "Moral integrity is the backbone of our nation. There have been too MANY people closely associated with President Johnson, guilty of wrongdoing morally or in mis-handling of funds. Although he knew them on a day to day basis
