

Democratic VIPs Hold Farmington Rally

Burette Staeble, wife of Neil Staeble, Democratic candidate for Governor, led a caravan of distinguished Democratic ladies into Farmington on Tuesday morning Oct. 20 at 10 a.m. Along with Mrs. Staeble, at the city's Democratic Headquarters, were Mrs. Robert Desognesi, wife of the Democratic candidate for Lt. Governor; Mrs. Arthur Schlesinger, Jr., wife of the Harvard historian, and former J.P.K. aide, Mrs. Bette

Carroll, Washington civic leader; educator Mary Jennings; and Mrs. Samuel Wistar Lanza, daughter of the late F. Scott Fitzgerald. Mrs. Lanza recently wrote a biography of her famous author father. The book became a best-seller.

The group drew a packed house, consisting predominantly of women. The audience was urged to vote straight Democratic. The speeches were followed by

coffee and merriment. Mrs. Staeble—looking very handsome, and, as usual, conservatively dressed—made the opening remarks, and introduced the other speakers.

For her, it was part of an exceedingly busy schedule. She usually has five to ten social activities planned throughout each day.

She has been hardened to this pace by 30 years of marriage and a pre-marital career as a singer.

She met Neil while she was a graduate student at the University of Michigan, seeking a Master's Degree in Music. While a student, she had her own radio show in Ann Arbor, "Songs Around the World," and sang hymns with the University quartet Sundays.

Mrs. Staeble is deeply involved in politics. She has two children and is very concerned about the kind of world they will grow up into.

Since her husband's election to Congress, she has been living in Washington. But the Staebles have been coming back to Michigan to campaign nearly every weekend since January.

Whatever her husband's fate on November 3 Burette Staeble expects to be in the vortex of politics for a long, long time. Her 21-year-old son, Mike, plans a political career, when he finishes law school. He is currently a history major at

Harvard. Mrs. Staeble's daughter, Liz, is 20, and is taking sociology at Michigan.
