### Proposed Bank In Township Stirs Up Row at Meeting

was an examination of the bids on the proposed construction of a maintenance building. After unsealing and reading several of them, Curt Hall, the supervisor recommended that the job be re-bid. The board agreed. All the bids had exceeded the estimate of the Township engineers.

Discussion of this issue produced considerable grumbling from the floor. Many seemed to feel that the estimated cost of \$8,000 might better be used to provide more adequate recreational facilities in the Township. Superintendent Hall replied in favor of re-bidding, and one was undecided. The rest were opposed. And 100% of those queried, felt that if a bank must be allowed in the subdivision, it should at least be colonial in design—to conform with the homes.

While it could not be determined whether the majority of Kimberly opposed re-zoning, it was obvious that wide-spread opposition does exist. Therefore the board decided to postpone action until after a meeting of all interested Kimberly residents can be arranged.

In order to hear complaints the board took the unusual action of suspending the rules and allowing the spectators to speak from the podium through the procedure of calling in for permission to enter in the day.

Among the interested spectators were Aldo Vagnozzi, Martin E. Gluckstein, and Bernard S. Kahn, recently defeated candidates for township offices. They were jubilant at the large turnout, and credited their strong showing, in garnering over 40 per cent of the vote, with making the board more responsive to public opinion.
