Combine pincapple, sugar, flour, spices and cook over low heat until mixture thick-ens. Add butter. Allow to cool. Pour in prepared pie shell. Use remainder of pastry to make lattice design for top. Seal edges well. Bake in hot oven for 10 minutes. Reduce temperature. Bake about 30 minutes longer until crust is cooked. Serves 6.
