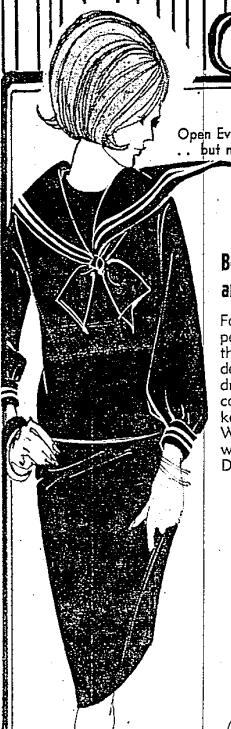


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TALKING ABOUT THURSTON

Miss Lindeman, one of Thurston's gym teachers, has returned to Thurston after a 105-day world-wide tour. On her trip, she visited 25 different countries each of which spoke a different language. Among the countries she visited were: France, Germany, England, Italy, Turkey, Egypt, Greece, Syria, Jordan, Israel, Lebanon, Thailand, Japan and China. In Spain she watched the swimming part of the Olympics. The purpose of her trip was to teach and promote synchronized swimming around the world in hopes of having it become an Olympic sport in 1988. Miss Lindeman served as the coach doctor and chaperone of 16 girls ranging in age from 15-20. The girls put on 36 shows before 60,000 people.

Thurston's choirs have already begun rehearsing for their annual Christmas Concert. Every Tuesday the groups have a rehearsal. All of the choirs and the orchestra will be participating in the concert which is Dec. 20. Many songs from the concert are going to be sung at a school assembly on Dec. 23. career of nursing and afterwards they were free to ask any questions they had. The members of the FNA are making Christmas gifts to take to elderly people. This is their service project for the year.

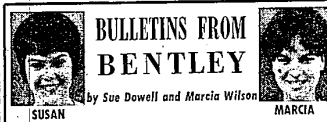

Also tomorrow the FHS Varsity Wrestling squad will compete with Redford Union in the Farmington gym at 7:30.

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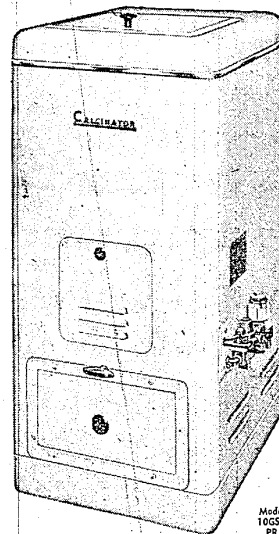
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
