

Professor Ettinger Ridiculed by Crane

Prof. Robert Ettinger, whose book, "The Prospect of Immortality," is well known in this area, appeared on the Las Crane show on ABC TV Friday night. It was an unfortunate encounter.

Whatever one may say about Ettinger's thesis—that life can be extended indefinitely—he is obviously a sincere advocate of it. This came through, along with his articulateness, in the face of his host's customary bad manners.

Ettinger appeared as part of a panel that included Dr. Rupert Billingsham, an eminent zoologist; Crane, an eminent biologist; and a comedian, Dr. Billingsham took issue with Ettinger's thesis—but on

scholarly grounds. Unfortunately, the two scholars were unable to carry on a serious discussion, because of the constant but unfunny interruptions of the other two panelists.

Actually, Ettinger proved to have the brightest sense of humor of all of them. "I don't propose to take death lying down," was an example.

Crane's discourtesy was so flagrant that his next guest, Artie Shaw, reprimanded him for it.

Shaw had read Ettinger's book, and appeared to agree with it.
