

Farmington Schedules 40 Adult Education Courses

More than 40 courses have been scheduled for the second term of the Farmington Public Schools Adult Education Program.

Director Dick Tyler has planned courses in such areas as business, crafts, fine arts, languages, liberal arts, homemaking, recreation and health. The 10-week term begins Jan. 11 with courses scheduled every night in the week except Friday, most of them at Farmington High School.

Advance enrollment will be accepted by mail on the forms issued by the Adult Education Department. Personal registration is set for Jan. 6 and 7 from 6:30 to 9:30 p.m., at Farmington High School.

High School Fees vary; by course but are mostly in the area of \$10 plus materials.

Any adult, regardless of age or educational background, may enroll. If a group of 10 or more people desire a course that has not been scheduled, they may contact Mr. Tyler at GR 6-0810.

For the first time this term arrangements have been made to offer subjects necessary for high school completion for those who need one to four credits for a diploma. All subjects are available and will be taught on a supervised correspondence basis. They may be taken for credit or as refreshers.

Clarenceville School Head Planning for the Future

Clarenceville School District Superintendent "Planning For Growth" might be used as a motto for the Board of Education and staff of the Clarenceville School District. Like many other suburban areas, there has been continual pupil growth, curriculum expansion and increased building. As we look back over 1964 we find growth and improvement in instruction at all levels. The Board of Education, in its desire to enrich the curriculum with the additional funds voted last June, made provisions for additional personnel in the fields of art, library, music, and elementary physical education. To assist many classroom teachers in broadening the scope of the program a full time helping teacher was provided to assist in the development of enrichment programs and to consider the materials and equipment which were desired. Monies for libraries were increased 100 per cent in an endeavor to provide more materials for all youngsters.

In another curriculum area provisions were made for an intensive in-service program in the teaching of School Mathematics Study Group mathematics. In the areas of reading the School District continued its various studies and is now participating in the Oakland County Cooperative Research Project. This project is "A Study of the Relative Effectiveness of Three Methods of Teaching Reading in Grade One." The results of this study is being shared and will continue to be shared with the entire faculty.

At the Junior High School level, the curriculum has been expanded to provide more creative writing, speech and drama, and special emphasis in certain areas of reading and mathematics. Home mechanics has been added as a unit of the Industrial Arts Department. With the addition of the program in the Senior High School the physical education program has been greatly expanded. As at the elementary school level the increase of library funds have made it possible to greatly increase the number and variety of books available to youngsters.

At the Senior High School level, a number of subjects have been added to the curriculum which include third year of French, advanced composition, Spanish, electronics, and industrial mathematics. The new gymnasium has made it possible to expand and include a greater variety of activities in the physical education program. The Cooperative Education Program in its infancy in the school year of 1963-64 has expanded and is providing broader experiences for many more pupils.

In spite of this progress plans of the Board of Education, administration and the staff call for increased study and consideration of many aspects of the school program. Because of increased pupil enrollment building needs will be of great importance in the discussion of the Board of Education early in the year of 1965 to be used in the scheduled election March 29, 1965. The type of facilities needed will actually be determined by the type of programs
