

At Leukemia Rally in Detroit

 Many Farmington teenagers were among the thousands of young people who attended the ALSAC rally held at the State Fair-Coliseum on the afternoon of September 20.

This rally was to honor the ALSAC marchers who collected \$110,333 for the St. Jude Children's Research Hospital in Memphis, Tennessee. The ALSAC (Aiding Leukemia Stricken American Children) Chapter of the greater Detroit Metropolitan Area, of which Farmington is a part, collected the largest sum of money in the nation.

At the rally such groups as Martha and the Vandellas and the Egyptians entertained the marchers. Honors were also presented to teenagers and adults for their outstanding service. The most outstanding prizes were trips to Cleveland where the National Convention of ALSAC will be held. Trips were awarded to the best Champion Leader and Marcher. The disc jockeys from WKRN were in charge of the program.

Miss Barbara Allen of 26255 Dundalk Lane in Farmington was awarded a radio for her service in the Teenage March. Barbara was the chairman of the Farmington group, which collected over \$1,600.

In the morning, some of the sleeping bags had frost on them. For breakfast at Peterson Lodge, they were allowed one slice of bread, one hard-boiled egg and one half pint of milk or a cup of coffee.

The work projects were painting the shower building, repairing roofs of the buildings or similar jobs.

They each fashioned an arrow, carving it out of wood. Anyone who broke the Order of Silence was forced to carve a notch in their own arrow.

SIMILAR PROJECTS were given to them in the afternoon and Saturday night, at the end of the Ordeal, they assembled in Peterson Lodge for the banquet and the allotting of the Indicia of the Order of the Arrow, Ordeal Membership Badge, Ordeal Sash and Pin and the Indicia of the Order of the Arrow. Saturday night they were escorted completely around the camp grounds in the dark by the Camp Guides. All Troop 110 Scouts successfully passed the Ordeal.

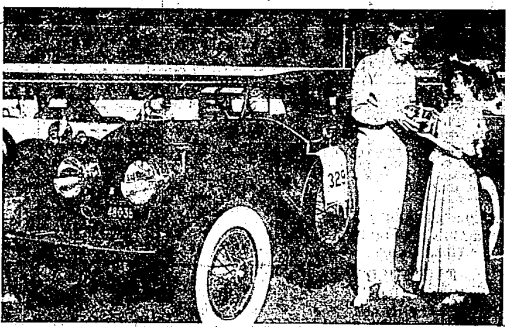

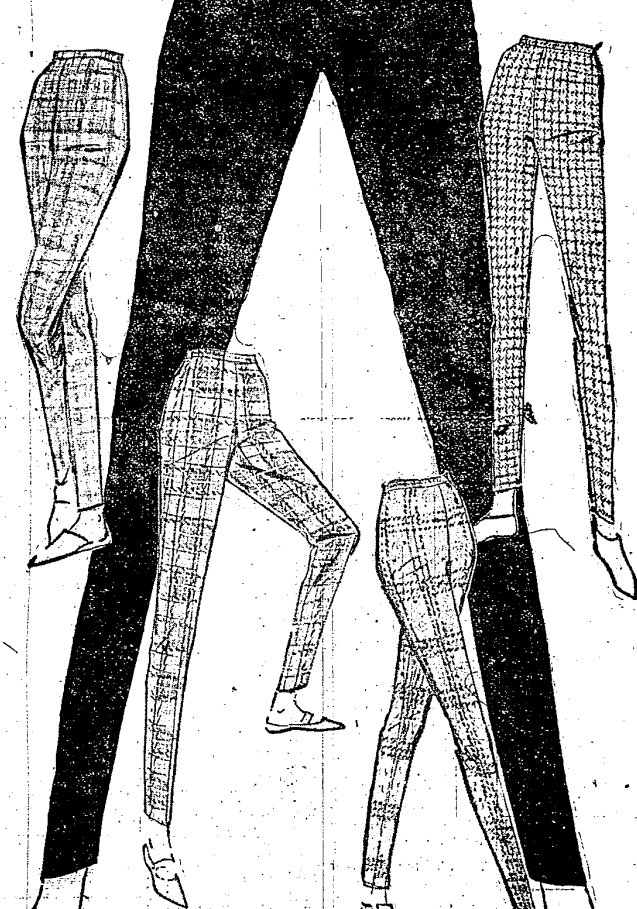
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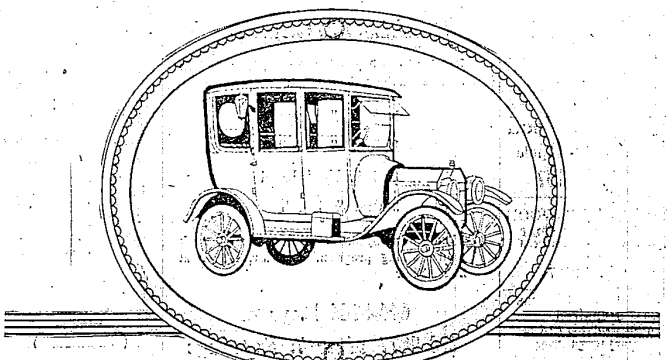
