

Horse Show Set Oct. 8, 9, 10, 11

The newest entry in the horse show field, the Michigan International Horse Show has vaulted into the top ten shows in only the second year since its inception.

The show will be held twice daily at the Michigan State Fairgrounds Coliseum, October 8, 9, 10 and 11 and is sponsored by the Metropolitan Kiwanis Clubs with proceeds going into their fund for underprivileged children.

More than 600 horses will be on the grounds when the show opens. The international competition will bring together champions from all areas of the country and Canada. They will compete for more than \$15,000 in cash prizes in addition to numerous trophies.

Ruby Speckelmeier, Oak Knoll Farm, Milford, Michigan is chairman of the show. He has received acceptance from many of the most competent men in the business to act as officials during the four-day show.

THE ROCKETS threatened several times but the drives were stymied by fumbles.


In the second period, after a line 22-yard run by Greg Adams, taking the ball to the 10-yard line, the second Rocket fumble gave the ball to the Rangers. Before the half ended, Farmington fumbled again; this time on a punt return, which otherwise would have put the Bantams in great scoring position.

After a series of nice runs by Haller, Adams, Harle, and Blancy, the Rockets took the opening second half kick-off over for the TD. The extra point by Steusloff was good.

The Rangers came right back and ran the kick-off return 60 yards, behind excellent blocking, to bring them within 1 point of Farmington. The extra point bid was thwarted.

Here, is where the case of fumblebug caught up with the Rockets, preventing them from getting their own drives under way, while handing the ball over to N. Redford several more times. The Rangers were able to put another score across, and handed the Rockets their first loss of the season against two victories.

FHS Gridders Down Plymouth in 13-7 Battle

The Farmington High School football team defeated Plymouth 13-7 in a game which saw the tide change many times.

The Falcons went into the game as underdogs but they played like champs. Bruce Charles was right there to pick up the ball and scamper 14 yards to pay-dirt. Wayne Johnston's try for extra point was wide and the Falcons found themselves ahead 6-0 early in the first quarter.

Plymouth quickly retaliated with a touchdown in the second quarter on a run around end to give them the lead 12-6. The try for extra point was good and Plymouth held a 7-6 edge at halftime.

THE SCORE was close enough but looking at the first half statistics, Plymouth held a greater edge. Farmington only gained 20 yards rushing and 9 yards passing while Plymouth gained 49 yards passing and 40 yards rushing.

At the start of the second half the Falcons had the ball and were penetrating deep into Plymouth territory as Ron Cleveland, Bruce Charles and Roy Leach were moving the ball. On the 15-yard line of Plymouth, Ron Leach found a gap opening through the middle and with unmatched power drove to the end zone to score Farmington's second touchdown and give them the lead 12-7. In the all important extra point, Wayne Johnston sailed the ball through the up-rights to give Farmington a 13-7 lead.

FARMINGTON coach Jack Hayes used a starting lineup of Dick Johnston (Captain) and Bruce Charles at the halfback slots, Roy Leach at fullback, Ron Cleveland at quarterback, Bill Crane at center, Mike Perry and Mike Freeman at the guard positions, Keith Collins and Rick Leach at the tackle positions, and Terry Nielsen and Tom Mitchell at the end positions.

The defensive alignment for Farmington was Johnston, Charles, Cleveland and Nielsen in the backfield; Ray Lardie and Mike Perry at the line-backer positions; Kessway and Crane at the tackle spots; Dick Isbell, who earned "Lineman of the week" honors, at the middle guard position; and Mitchell and Leach at the defensive end positions.

In the first down department, FHS rolled up eight to Plymouth's seven. However, Farmington ended up with a better edge in most other game statistics, bettering Plymouth in total yards gained rushing (66-40).

FHS COMPLETED 5 out of 9 passes attempted for a total yardage of 34, compared to a record of 9 pass completions out of 18 attempts for Plymouth.


Farmington's punts sailed an average of 34 yards in seven kicks while FHS had five kicks travel an average of just 29 yards. FHS fumbled only once and recovered their own fumble while Plymouth fumbled three times and lost the ball on one costly occasion that gave the Falcons their first touchdown. Farmington returned six Plymouth kicks for a total of 55 yards compared to Plymouth's total yardage on eight kick returns of just 42 yards.

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
